Dear Friends,

I have thought a lot about what on earth I am going to say in this Easter edition of my letter. Easter is about resurrection, hope and the promise of something beyond the darkness of



suffering and death. As I write the people of East Africa are facing imminent starvation; the news is full of terrible images of the effects of hunger. In Iraq and Syria ordinary people suffer as war devastates their countries and many people continue to risk their lives to escape that devastation, thousands of people languish in refugee camps. Where is resurrection and hope for these people? I just can't sit here and glibly write about Easter hope without reference to the above and to be honest I don't know the answer to my question.

We live in such a ridiculous world don't we? Everyday it seems there is another article in the newspapers about how the obesity epidemic is killing us. We are surrounded by a plethora of food, too much food, and we waste an absolutely colossal amount. You don't need me to tell you that something is wrong.

The Christian message is that Jesus came and lived among us to share what it means to be human and died and rose again so that we might have eternal life. What does that actually mean? What do we think eternal life is? Is it life after death, a nice cosy home with God in heaven when we die, and what or where is heaven? To be honest I don't know the answer to these questions either. I do believe that when we die in some mysterious way we are united with God but I wouldn't presume to know what that looks like.

So is that it do you think, is the idea of eternal life *only* about the hereafter, doesn't it have something to do with the now as well? In the Old Testament there is a very powerful imperative to care for the orphan and the stranger, to see that justice for the poor is upheld, essentially to love God and neighbour. Jesus took this one step further and blew apart the prevailing understanding of justice, which we find difficult to live by anyway because we are human and innately selfish. The stories that Jesus told and the way he lived show us that eternal life *is* very much about the here and now, it's about life in all its fullness for *all* people. Resurrection isn't just something that happened two thousand years ago, it needs to happen now and we all have a part to play in trying to bring about the possibility of resurrection for those who are in such dire need. Yes, it's easy to feel overwhelmed and disengage from what is happening but we who live such privileged lives surely have a part to play in bringing hope to those for whom all hope seems lost.

Sorry not to write about eggs and chocolate etc, of course there is a place for them too, and we should enjoy the good gifts God gives us, but let's not forget that Easter is for all of God's children and not just for us.

The BBC are making a new television show for BBC2 called 'The repair shop'; the show looks into repairing beloved and interesting possessions for people who would like to see them restored or repaired back to their original working order. The kind of items we have come across so far have ranged from



inherited pocket watches to grandfather clocks, from rocking horses to drawn carriages, even from toy cars to VW campers. We have a team of experts who cover all trades such as blacksmithing, ceramics, clockmakers, upholsterers and carpenters.

Additionally, we would like to feature and repair a few items in the show that have a community value, something treasured or something essential to munities that has fallen into disrepair, perhaps has an interesting story and purpose to the village/town that can be restored. For example some towns, villages and communities have certain items that are important to them; they could be memorial plaques, eroded statues, snapped weather vanes, broken sun dials, cracked gargoyles, fading carvings, or maybe the paint is peeling on your local pub swing sign. Please note that although a lot of things can be moved, items would need not to be permanently stuck in situ. Recipe: Posh Chicken fricassee with Artichokes

Ingredients:

4 boneless chicken breasts, skin on or off 4 globe artichokes

2 lemons 50g butter 2 tbsp olive oil 25g flour

1 shallot, finely diced 2 garlic cloves,

crushed

200g mushrooms wiped and sliced 200ml dry white wine

torn basil leaves or chopped parsley or both zest of 1 lemon

sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method: If you have time, brine the chicken breasts to keep them plump and moist. Meanwhile, tackle your artichokes.

Cut off the stalk about 1cm from the globe. Peel off the outer leaves, rubbing on lemon juice as you go to stop the artichoke going black. When you reach the heart, cut off the top about a third of the way up from the base and discard the top two-thirds. Take a melon baller or a spoon and dig out the choke – the fuzzy hairy centre. With a small knife, carve off the outer skin of the heart, then rub it with lemon juice. Prepare the rest of the artichokes in the same way and cut each one into about 6 slices. Bring a shallow pan of water to a simmer and add a good squeeze of lemon juice. Add the artichoke slices and simmer them for about 5 minutes, then cover the pan and set aside.

Blot the chicken breasts dry on kitchen paper, place them between a couple of pieces of cling film and beat them out briefly. Spread the flour out on a plate, season it, then coat the chicken in the flour.

Heat half the butter and a tablespoon of oil in a heavy-bottomed frying pan with a lid. Add the chicken and cook for a minute or so until golden, then turn it over, put the lid on the pan and cook gently for 10 minutes. Remove the chicken, wrap it all in foil and leave it to rest for 10 minutes.

Heat the rest of the butter and oil in the pan and gently cook the shallot for about 5 minutes until translucent. Add the garlic and cook for another minute, then add the artichokes and mushrooms and cook them until they start to colour. Pour in the wine and a tablespoon of lemon juice and cook until the liquid has reduced by half. Remove the pan from the heat and gently stir in the grated zest of one lemon and the herbs. Divide the artichokes and mushrooms between 4 plates, top with a chicken breast and drizzle over the resting juices.

The Big Farmland Bird Count at Pertwood

Early February means it is time for the Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust's (GWCT) Big Farmland Bird Count. Following on from the RSPB's Big Garden Birdcount at the end of January, this is a count on two hectares of farmland, for around 30 minutes, to see which birds are using it. The shooting season for pheasant and red-legged partridge finishes at the end of January, so it is a good time for anyone with an area they have been feeding through the winter for these birds to see what else is in there. As you might know, we do not have any gamebird shooting at Lower Pertwood, and all the areas we plant for birds to feed in are left for the birds to eat and use as cover. The only visitors are me, to see who is in there, and Gerwyn and Nic who put out additional food from now on.

I decided to count around the Test Piece of sacrificial crop as it has been popular with the birds over the last week or two. I was not disappointed! I timed the count for just after sunrise, which is when most birds head to their go-to feeding site to get a hearty breakfast. During the count period I recorded 446 birds of 26 species. Test Piece is surrounded by hedges, scrub and



trees so attracts a wide variety of species. Species of high conservation concern (red-listed) were present in decent numbers. Corn bunting numbered 46 and were landing in the trees around the plot before dropping to their feeding areas, and similarly the 58 yellowhammer were arriving, and then splitting up to drop down. The 151 linnet came straight into the field to feed on the small seeds available there, like charlock and linseed. A couple of skylark are an unusual site in such a confined field, whereas the five song thrush are often a species that roots around for slugs and snails in the cover. Other species of interest were 12 stock dove and only seven



woodpigeon - unusual to have woodpigeon outnumbered by their smaller brethren. Twelve meadow pipit were feeding in the areas of grassland around the edge and 39 pheasant had decided it was safer in Test Piece than elsewhere!

Nature Notes

The dawn chorus is really getting going now with all the birds singing to stake out their patch, they sing again in the evening but it is not so marked. We have had house sparrows, blue tits and great tits showing interest in nest boxes, all the birds are pairing up and I have seen female blackbirds busy gathering



nesting material. The daffodils in the parish are lovely, a big thank you to all the bulb planters, and the gardens are looking very colourful with primroses, crocuses, hyacinths, early tulips and daffodils. It is a beautiful time of the year.

The pond has been very active. I first noticed frog spawn on the 27th February, it may have been there for a few days, floating on the surface at the shallow end, but the frogs never seem to announce their presence. This year the ducks have left it alone, perhaps because it is at the shallow end, and it is now at the hatching stage with the little tadpoles coming out of the jelly. I first became aware of toads overnight 8th-9th March when I could hear the males croaking. Looking in the pond on the morning of the 9th it was very easy to count over 50 toads. They have continued to be active this last week, though today things seem to have calmed. Their activity is very temperature sensitive, it needs to be warm enough; whereas frogs become active earlier, but in doing so can risk their spawn becoming frozen, especially as it floats on the surface. On warmer sunny days there have been mass toad orgies with them mating on the surface; the bigger female surrounded by numerous smaller competing males. They lay their spawn deep down in amongst the weed. All this amphibian activity has not gone unnoticed; buzzards have been coming into the garden to catch them, often taking their prey onto the summerhouse roof. Watching the buzzards it would appear that they do not find it easy to make a kill, the frog or toad wriggling around fighting back but no match for the massive talons gripping it. I have not spotted any herons this year but that is not to say that they have not been in to hunt. I am surprised the kingfisher is not coming more often as the fish are coming up on the surface with the weather and today they were jumping.

A pair of mallard ducks were coming daily but for the last week we have hardly seen the female, I am pretty sure she must be sitting on eggs; the incubation period is



28 days. I noticed the female mute swan sitting already in The Marsh, which is quite early. Their incubation period is 6 weeks being such a big bird.

The warm sunny days that we have had recently have brought out some butterflies. I spotted 2 brimstones the other day and I have had reports of small tortoiseshell and peacock. The extra

warmth has sparked lots of insects into action; ladybirds, lacewings, bumblebees and honeybees. Just a few degrees rise in temperature makes all the difference. I think that spring is the best time of the year with everything waking up and coming into flower. Enjoy!
