

Dear Friends,

I notice the fruit growing on our apple trees and the ancient downs rising up beyond the garden with the promise of another beautiful day; I know I am very blessed to live in such a place.

In the course of this conversation some words from the prayer attributed to St Francis popped into my head, 'Where there is hatred, let me sow love'. What a blessing it would be to our broken world if we could each make an effort to live out those words! It is a challenge I know but one we desperately need to respond to. So I leave you with that challenge; 'where there is hatred, let me sow love' What does that look like in your life?

Nature Notes

The moorhens managed to produce 6 chicks - bundles of black fluff. I spotted the first youngster on the 18th June, the following day I counted 3 chicks and this had doubled by the next day. The parents were very good at feeding and protecting them but I noticed after a while, probably a week to 10 days, the constant begging of the chicks was wearing thin on them and they would become quite aggressive. Presumably this behaviour nurtures independence and the youngsters did start feeding themselves and being more adventurous leaving the pond via the ramps. Two weeks after I first spotted a chick there was an attack from a buzzard; it was early morning when I was out in the garden feeding the birds. I didn't see anything in the buzzard's talons as it flew away but later I could only count 5 chicks. The following day the adult moorhens had disappeared and we were left with just one lonely chick. We think the adults led the other 4 chicks away and the 5th just got left behind. I expect the buzzard attack initiated the move. The one chick is still with us and growing well. I



feed the fish and managed to buy some very small floating pellets the moorhen chick will take; should be a good source of protein. There is plenty of insect life in and around the pond and vegetation, they are omnivores so will eat anything. I don't know what the future holds as it will not have experienced anywhere but our pond and it has no guide to lead it away.

The pond has also been busy with ducks, dragonflies and damselflies. The kingfisher has been visiting again almost daily for the last week, we have not seen him for months. The tadpoles are developing well and we have seen the odd tiny toadlet/ froglet on the ramps. I doubt if they will start to move away from the pond in this hot, dry weather as they would risk desiccation. As soon as we get a decent rainfall there will be a mass exodus. This is a good time in the notes to say a very big thank you to the Longbridge Show Committee for the Toad Signs; they will be just the job in spring.

A lot of the garden birds are coming to the end of the breeding season and going into moult. The blackbirds are looking particularly scruffy. I know I have a least one pair of blackbirds still feeding young, collecting the sultanas that I am putting out. I would normally have stopped doing this, but the hot dry weather has baked the ground making digging for worms and grubs very difficult, so hopefully the sultanas will have eased the situation. One morning I saw 3 young robins and a parent under the feeders; I don't think I have ever seen more than one young robin at a time. I have also spotted young goldfinches on the feeders; I heard their begging pleas first, so noisy. Three young swallows flew from the stables and I think the parents are now sitting again; the first house martin broods have also flown; I am waiting to hear the cheeping of another brood(s).



Finally, I saw a hummingbird hawkmoth on the 19th June, feeding on the valerian on the patio, also several scarlet tiger moths but nowhere near enough butterflies.

Police security advice

Garden security: This is very important as the garden is an access point into your home. Secure your garden with lockable gates and walls or substantial fencing. Thorny plants around the perimeter and trellis on top of fences make it harder for an intruder to access your garden. Keep your ladder and garden tools locked away, as they can be used by burglars to access your home. Keep tools inside if you do not have a garden shed. Remember to lock garage and shed windows and doors. Use electronic shed alarms or padlock alarms to deter thieves. Make sure any valuable items stored in sheds are well-secured, to a ground / wall anchor where possible. Store bins securely to prevent them from being used to access upstairs windows or flat roofs. Outside security lighting can act as a deterrent for burglars.

When you go away: Make sure your premises are secured every time you leave, even if only for a short time. Make sure your alarm, if fitted, is set. Put lights on a timer switch to make your house look occupied. You can also get timer switches for the radio and television. Ask a neighbour to push post through your letterbox and take in any deliveries for you. Cancel milk, newspapers and other deliveries. Ask a neighbour to park a car on your drive so passers-by assume someone is at home.

It is the responsibility of Wiltshire Council to ensure that verges are maintained (often partnering with local landowners). But we can do a lot ourselves to look after roadsides, particularly adjacent to our own properties. The Parish Council encourages owners to remove weeds, especially around hard structures, such as walls and bridges, outside their property and keep hedges from encroaching onto our narrow roads. It makes all the difference to the look of our lovely villages.

Monkton Deverill Broadband

Our long running project to secure faster broadband in the Upper Deverills resulted in new fibre-enabled green cabinets in Kingston and Brixton Deverill. Monkton Deverill then became the poor relation as far as average speeds were concerned as the copper lines had to run to the cabinet at Kingston. In July Openreach began work to install a new fibre-enabled green cabinet for Monkton Deverill. This will greatly improve potential speeds and reliability for Monkton once it is operational. However, residents do need to remember the speed delivered will depend on what the contract with your provider offers as higher speeds may involve increased costs. If necessary, contact your broadband provider, not Openreach.
