Dear Friends,

I can't believe I am writing the February letter already!

I spent this last weekend on a wonderful course called 'Guts and Gaia' exploring the healthy connections between the bacteria within our bodies and the bacteria within the earth. I had great fun learning simple fermentation techniques to make foods that promote good gut health and overall wellbeing. It was an incredibly joyous and inspiring time and I now have a jar of sauerkraut and a jar of kimchi fermenting away in my kitchen, two beautiful sour dough loaves in the bread bin, and some very pungent sour dough starter in the fridge. I have to be very careful in opening the sauerkraut jar as you can literally see the contents bubbling as the bacteria do their amazing work of fermentation. I've known for a long while how important it is for our own gut health to eat fermented foods but I've not made them before; I must say nature is so very clever at providing us with the means to nurture our own health with something so mysteriously alive and active

I'm no scientist but we did have some theoretical input about bacteria and how vital it is in maintaining balance within the earth and within our bodies. And this remarkable and mysterious biological process has been happening since the birth of time and still goes on unnoticed and largely unacknowledged. Like so much of the working of the natural world we are oblivious to that which we cannot see or quantify. The first miraculous snowdrops are emerging as I write, we marvel at them because it seems almost impossible that in the dead of winter such delicate and beautiful plants can emerge out of the cold dark earth. Of course nature has been doing her work under the soil, life and change and growth have never stopped it's just that we cannot see it.

Looking at hugely magnified slides of bacteria I was humbled and awestruck at the interconnectedness of all things and how the natural world works in harmony for the good of the created order. Tragically, it is we human beings who have come along and broken this harmony with our greed and self-centeredness. But more than this, I felt a deep sense of wonder at the mystery of life and the mystery of the divine presence who is at the heart of all things and who is not disconnected from our world but rather animates every living thing; all time, all life, all the mysterious 'being' of the universe, all the complex patterns in nature are held within the beating heart of God.

So wrap up warm and go and find some snowdrops and give thanks for the gifts, seen and unseen, that Mother Nature so generously and wonderfully shares with us.

Thank You Judy

Have you ever wondered at how much work, time and care this Parish News takes to prepare? As a 'very' temporary editor of this month's News I see the whole production in a very different light. It takes hours of time and dedication and Judy has been doing it for 14 years and without her skill and energy we would never have this Parish News. Thank you Judy.

Nature Notes

I've been walking round the garden looking for signs of spring and I haven't been disappointed. Snowdrops are now just showing, flower buds and the early dainty mauve crocuses that self-seed readily are popping up here, there and everywhere. On sunny days they open their flower heads fully showing the lovely orange stamen. The daffodils are coming up and I've found one primrose in flower so far. In a sheltered spot at the front of the house I've a clump of cyclamen coum flowering and I've had to cover them with some twigs as I noticed the flower heads were being broken off; probably by a woodpigeon or woodpigeons! Tucked up against the footings of the greenhouse I've an Algerian iris which has lovely lavender blue flowers. It's bloomed really well this year, but in the last week or so the flowers have been mysteriously disappearing and lately the leaves have been cropped; I suspect a deer. The snowdrops under the cherry tree were in danger of being scraped out by the pheasants that regularly visit the garden, so I've had to cover them with some broken twigs. The joys of gardening out in the countryside. Elsewhere in the garden hellabores are just coming into bloom and the odd pulmonaria is in flower. We've several shrubs with scented flowers that are now blossoming; a Christmas Box (Sarcococca), and a Mahonia Japonica which has a gorgeous lily of the valley fragrance. Last but not least there are the yellow flowers of the winter jasmine. So the garden is awakening.

The birds are beginning to respond to the lengthening days. I've heard both mistle and song thrush singing. We've had a nuthatch calling in the garden and visiting the peanut feeder. The great spotted woodpeckers are regular visitors to the peanuts, and the male has been drumming on the nearby transformer pole. I've heard the green woodpecker calling or should I say laughing 'cos that's what it sounds like. I've noticed that the birds are becoming more defensive as they start to hold territories, especially the robins and blackbirds. All the birds are coming into their breeding plumage. I was struck by the gorgeous colours of a dunnoek (hedge sparrow) earlier today; various shades of brown with some almost orange contrasted with the grey head. It was feeding on the saddle stone, where I place mixed seed and sultanas, just in front of the kitchen window. The sultanas are primarily for the blackbirds though the robins take the odd one too. If you are feeding sultanas or other dried fruit then make sure that it's out of reach of dogs. I hadn't realised until recently that grapes and dried fruits (i.e. raisins, currants and sultanas) as well as foods that contain them, can be poisonous to dogs (and potentially to cats). Worst case scenario causing renal failure. I've spotted some interest in the bird box on the beech tree at the front of the house. One day there was a pair of blue tits and a pair of great tits having a look. It always seems to be a popular box; it's well sheltered and on a good mature tree. We've not yet cleaned the boxes out from last year and it's on the list of jobs to do! If you're thinking of putting up a new box it should be done in the next month.

The 2018 Rainfall Report for the Deverills, and Crockerton Parish.

The rainfall recorded in the Deverills, and Crockerton Parish, (or Catchment area), during 2018 reveals the average taken from 8 different rain gauges is 33.23 inches.

The weather experienced during 2018 produced more contrasts than usual. The Beast from the East blew in during mid February, and we endured 18 nights of frost in February followed by a further 7 colder nights in March, plus a blast of snow from March 18th to 20th. Then along came the whole of June and first two weeks of July, when we sweltered in the longest hottest dry period for 42 years. This drought ended on July 14th, with a major downpour of rain, in fact it was a welcome 1.2 inches of rain. The coldest days were January 24th and March 1st, when minus 8 Centigrade was recorded. The hottest day was July 9th, when we sweltered at 32 degrees. The wettest days were July 14th and December 19th, when over an inch of rain fell on each day, December was the wettest month; over 4 inches of rain was recorded. June was the driest month, with almost no rain to record. The rainfall over the past 19 years for this Parish reveals an Annual Average of 34.48 inches. The wettest year was 2014 with 42.87 inches. The driest year was 2010 with 27.23 inches.

If anyone wishes to join my team of rainfall measurers. Please get in touch, and I will be delighted to help. The site for a rain gauge is all important. It needs to be well away from trees and buildings. The top of the gauge must be absolutely level. A gauge looking rather wobbly on a fence post will not provide an accurate result.

Chasing Stars with Cranborne Chase AONB

Did you know that, due to light pollution, over 85% of people in the UK cannot see the Milky Way Galaxy from where they live? Across the Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), however, we are fortunate to enjoy some of the highest quality night skies in the south of England. It's worth taking a look at the 'night blight' maps produced by the Campaign to Protect Rural England

(www.nightblight.cpre.org.uk/maps), to spot the dark area of the AONB between Salisbury, Bournemouth, Warminster and Blandford Forum. Zoom in to the map below Warminster, and you'll see that Longbridge Deverill, Crockerton and Hill Deverill are in one of the areas of low light pollution.

Dark night skies are good for human health and wildlife (light pollution disturbs natural rhythms of sleep and activity), as well for stargazing and tranquillity. In order to recognise and preserve our beautiful starry skies for the future, the AONB is bidding to become an International Dark Sky Reserve (IDSR), a designation given by the International Dark-Sky Association; we are working with local communities and others to achieve this prestigious award and, if successful, we would be only the fifth IDSR in the UK. We need to demonstrate support, so we are encouraging people to sign our dark sky pledge, which you can find on the homepage of our Chasing Stars website: <http://www.chasingstars.org.uk/>. It only takes a minute or two, but will be a huge help to the success of the bid.

Frauds, Scams and Cyber Crime

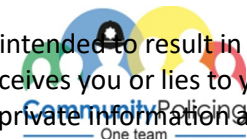
Fraud is the dishonest and intentional deception of a person intended to result in financial or personal gain. Fraud happens when someone deceives you or lies to you to gain an advantage, such as taking your money or finding out private information about you. Fraud could happen in person, over the telephone, or online via email, text or a website. Action Fraud deals specifically with fraud issues. Cyber Crime

Cyber crime is one of the fastest growing areas of crime, affecting businesses as well as individuals. We often break cyber-crime down into two categories:

Cyber-enabled crime, traditional crimes committed using the internet such as theft, harassment, fraud, identity theft, selling stolen goods, drug dealing.

Cyber-dependent crime, online crimes where a digital system is the target. These include attacks on computer systems to disrupt IT infrastructures, such as; unauthorised access (hacking), malicious software programming (malware) or denial of service attacks.
