Dear Friends,

I don't know about your garden but mine is a quagmire, particularly the chicken run. We have 7 chickens and they have a really big area of the garden to live in but the grass does not stand a chance against the torrential and persistent rain we are experiencing this winter. Mud rules in the chicken run, it takes a good deal of effort to stay upright when collecting the eggs. But the chickens don't seem to mind and come charging up to the fence when we appear in the garden hopeful that there will be a treat or two on offer.

Despite the rain there are signs of better things in the natural world; defying the winter weather bulbs can be seen thrusting through the cold wet soil and those magical white jewels we call snowdrops have miraculously appeared; they are such a sign of hope.

Lenten preparation Bishop Andrew is coming to lead a pilgrimage around the Benefice on Wednesday 4th March. You need not worry if you are not fit enough to join in the actual walk; we will be stopping at several of the churches along the way for a few words from Bishop Andrew and some refreshments so you can join in then. > book which is by Ruth Valerio: 'Saying Yes to Life'. In the forward Archbishop Justin writes: 'It is of the utmost importance that we now stand in solidarity together, repenting of our sins towards our earth and committing to face our

responsibilities as God's people. As people of faith (I would add as human beings) we cannot just say what we believe. We are obliged to live out the life that Christ calls us to live, to care for our neighbours, for the creatures and the creation God has so generously given us.' I could not agree more, belief does not just mean verbally agreeing with certain statements or creeds, it means living them day by day, minute by minute, and we will stumble and fail and get in a muddle, but we just have to pick ourselves up, dust ourselves down and keep trying even though it is hard. Which is why we need a bit of help now and again, so I am asking you to join me in reading this book throughout the 40 days of Lent. You can read it on your own or maybe gather a little group together to discuss it. Oh what a joy to see the sun and have a dry day and not be so windy! I think today has been the best we have had for ages. I had a walk around Stourhead this afternoon on the way home from my



singing group at Mere. There were lots of snowdrops coming out, primroses appearing and white hellebores. Daffodils were shooting up but none out. On the way back through Maiden Bradley, I spotted a clump of daffodils with about 4 flowers at the 'trumpet' stage in a front garden. Driving back from Southampton on Saturday we saw a single daffodil fully out in a garden at Nunton. In our garden we have lots of bulbs pushing up and bright pink cyclamen coum, there are some early mauve crocuses just beginning to flower behind the rockery and several clumps of snowdrops where the buds are just breaking to show the white flowers. It is lovely to see all these signs of spring. We also have an Algerian iris out which has gorgeous lavender blue flowers and a mahonia japonica which has lily of the valley fragrance.

The birds are beginning to sing more. The song thrushes have been especially vocal with their clear, strong song of repeated phrases. The robins are also singing with more gusto and beginning to be more territorial; great tits and blue tits are singing more too. We have recently had long-tailed tits coming to the feeders and they continually 'chatter' to each other in the family group. The other afternoon I am sure I heard a corn bunting singing just beyond our garden. The song is likened to a jungling bunch of keys and



just beyond our garden. The song is likened to a jangling bunch of keys and I've seen and heard them in the nearby farmland which I didn't expect to hear so early in the year. It has been quite mild so it wouldn't surprise me to hear of early nesting robins or blackbirds soon, and frog spawn, if the temperatures remain relatively high.



A moorhen has returned to the pond on the 16th December. We are fairly sure it is one of the youngsters born here last summer. It knew exactly where to find food under the bird feeders. When it arrived it was still in juvenile plumage (buff-brown with green frontal plate) but over the past month the frontal plate has changed to the bright red of an adult. It loves

the fish food pellets I throw to the fish so now I throw in extra for it. I have seen the grey wagtail eating the pellets too! When I was at the pond the other morning I noticed a reflection in the water of a big bird just above me. Looking up I expected a crow or raven but it was a beautiful low flying red kite; a great start to the morning.

The lovely sun we had today really showed up the different colours of the tree barks at Stourhead and, on the journey home, the white of the silver birches, the red of the dogwoods and the yellow willows. The moss on the tree trunks at Stourhead seemed especially green, probably due to all the rain. The Christmas tree remains unplanted due to the wet weather, but I have managed to plant a fragrant honey suckle. The weather forecast this evening sounds hopeful with dry conditions from the weekend onwards. We might finally be able to check and clean out the bird boxes.

The 2019 Rainfall Report for the Deverills and Crockerton Parish



The rainfall recorded during 2019 at various sites within the Parish and catchment area only. The amount taken from the 6 different rain gauges and averaged out is 40.70 inches. I think it fair to say the weather during 2019 may be split in two. January to end of August was reasonably normal, and then the rain

really started from 1st September to the end of the year providing just over 21 inches recorded. It was not the wettest of years; 2014 was much wetter. The coldest temperature of the year minus 10 Centigrade was recorded on 3rd February. The hottest day being 25th July recording 30C. The wettest day 23rd September with 36mm or 1.4 inches.

July was generally a sunny month, and we enjoyed quite a heat wave from 20th to 29th July, on 30th July the weather broke as usual with a thunderstorm, and down came an inch of rain.

In August the Harvest month started well with 27C recorded on the 3rd. Then it became a constant nightmare for the farming community with rain recorded every day from the 4th to the 20th August.

The four months from 1st September, my records say one after the other, "another wet month". This has caused many acres of winter crops not to be planted, the ground conditions have been too wet. So, we may see an increase in Spring planting provided the ground dries out enough. October was the wettest month with 6.61 Inches.

I am regularly asked about Global warming and my answer is simply: it is happening. There is no point denying the facts.

My various weather watching friends have supplied me with their rain gauge details for 2019 and for your interest. Codford recorded 36 inches in 2019. Near Marshfield North Wiltshire recorded 44 inches, and my old home near Launceston in Cornwall 50 inches. Today someone told me that a friend of his who lives on the West Coast of Scotland has recorded 140 inches in 2019. Therefore, I am very glad I live here!

Starting from the year 2000 the rainfall recorded here at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill is as follows.

The average of the above figures from the last 20 years shows that in this Parish, the annual average rainfall is 34.68 inches.

Upper Deverills Parish Council - VE Day 75 celebrations



God in Ordinary

The cathedral had a new Christmas nativity of photographs that looked like a huge painting. The people in it were from the local community. Christmas celebrates God among us. Like the shepherds and the wise men we came to the crib to wonder and worship but when we went away to get on with the rest of our lives, what happens next?



One answer is the Church's year continues to tell the Christian stories of God in Jesus who teaches, challenges, heals and gives life to us. Christmas gives way to Epiphany; on 2nd February we remember the Presentation of Christ in the Temple and his being recognised by the elderly Simeon and Anna; and this year at the end of the month, on 26th February, Ash Wednesday is the start of Lent and our preparation for Easter.

Other answers are also needed in trying to find what it means for God to be among us. How do we respond in our daily lives? What difference does it make to the way I understand myself and how we live together? We have often used Lent for those reflective questions.

This year, instead of Praying Together as we have done for the last three years, I hope that as a diocese we will use the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book by Ruth Valerio, 'Saying Yes to Life'. "As people made in the image of God, we are entrusted to look after what he has created: to share in God's joy and ingenuity in making a difference for good." Using the story of the days of creation in Genesis 1 she, "relates light, water, land, the seasons, other creatures, humankind, Sabbath rest and resurrection hope to matters of environmental, ethical and social concern." There are small, cheaper booklets for kids and adults to go alongside it, 'A 40-Day Challenge to Live Lent and Care for God's Creation'.

Asking what it means in our ordinary lives that God is among us is a good way to keep Lent. There is no single settled answer because we keep deepening our response to God come among us. What do we pray for? Whom do we serve? How will we grow? Living in response to those questions renews our hope.

Bogus Callers

We have had reports of people going to addresses in Warminster and Westbury purporting to be working for the Waterboard. The caller has called on elderly residents and talked their way into homes where items have been stolen. The caller has been very plausible, but no identification has been shown. If you are not expecting a visit,



refuse entry to your home, ask the caller to provide identity, shut and lock your door leaving the caller outside. Call the number for the company from the ones found on the internet or in your Telephone Directory to confirm the caller has been authorised to call on you; do not use the number provided by the person at your door.

Recently local residents have been called by people claiming to be from Police or Police Squad who had some basic details about the resident. Please do not divulge you personal PIN, security question answers or other personal details over the phone. These residents had money taken from their accounts. If you receive any of these calls hang up, WAIT 15 to 20 minutes and call your own bank, again using the telephone numbers listed for your bank on the internet, telephone book, your bank card, or other documents you already have at home. Do not immediately call your bank from your phone, as the caller may not have hung up and you will still be talking to someone trying to steal your money.
