Dear Friends,

‘A cold coming we had of it,
Just the worst time of year
For a journey, and such a long journey:
The ways deep and the weather sharp,
The very dead of winter.’



The above quote is from T.S. Elliot's evocative poem 'Journey of the Maji'. It seems to me that, even though by New Year we have passed the shortest day, January really does seem like the dead of winter. Christmas has passed and the tree looks rather sad and redundant in the corner, its needles in the carpet a sharp reminder that normality must now be embraced rather than the joys (and sorrows!) of the festive season. In this country we tend to lump all the different facets of the Christmas story together, and we forget that actually we have another glorious Christmas story to celebrate on 6th January, the Epiphany, or as my Spanish family would say, 'The Day of the Kings'.

The three kings, if you recall, came from many, many miles away to pay homage to Jesus. They were, we are told, 'from the East' and after their visit they returned to 'a foreign country'. So, let's get this clear: the three wise men are *foreigners*, they are different, other, immigrants, not like us, interlopers, strangers, people to be regarded with fear and suspicion, people it is necessary to keep an eye on to make sure they do not take advantage of the system and use up scarce resources that are rightfully ours.

All of this makes the journey of the Three Wise Men much more than just a pretty story to round off the nativity, because it is about inclusivity in its broadest sense. The gospel writer included it in his Good News to tell us a much deeper story which we find very difficult to hear; that God's love is for *everyone* and that no one in the human family has the right to decide who gets what because everyone is deserving of God's love and of the right to live in circumstances that enable the best of human flourishing. I hope you can see why this story is so important to hear in the world we live in today, such a confusing world of terrible inequality and pain.

So, after their visit the three strange foreigners 'return home another way' as the gospel writer puts it; their journey has changed them forever:

‘We returned to our places, these kingdoms,
But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation,
With an alien people clutching their Gods.’

I wonder what journeys, metaphorical or otherwise, you will make in this coming year? Whatever they are I hope they will be blessing to you and that through them you may bring blessing to others.

Nature Notes

Not long now and we will pass the shortest day (21st December). At the moment the light is going by four in the afternoon. Today has been the worst so far with heavy rain and a cold wind. Hopefully by the time we get to mid-January we will notice the days lengthening. The birds will respond by starting to sing and spring will be just around the corner. We have got some daffodils bulbs already shooting.

The bird feeders are busy on cold days. I am feeding sunflower hearts, high energy mix bird seed, fat balls and peanuts. Most days we have great spotted woodpecker on the peanuts; the male and the female take turns on the feeder and it is easy to tell them apart as the male has red on the back of the neck. We have had a female green woodpecker visiting the garden. I have noticed she comes on milder days and when the ground is softer after rain; I presume the insects in the soil would be more active if it is warmer and probing with her long beak and using her tongue is obviously easier when the ground is soft. She spends ages out there on the lawn when conditions are ideal. I can tell that it is the female as there is no red stripe within the moustache.



We have visited the Hawk Conservancy again. Back on the 17th November it was my brother's 70th birthday and we met up with him and his wife there for the day. We were lucky with the weather; a bright clear sunny day, a touch cold and just a bit of wind, perfect flying conditions. They were on their winter programme with two flying displays (in the summer there are three a day). They fly the birds so close to the audience and often have several in the air at once. During the display there is a running commentary of information on the birds. The first display was of Woodland Owls, held amongst the trees, (just the right habitat), my favourite of these was the pair of great grey owls; but they were all lovely. After a good lunch in the café the second display was entitled the World of Birds of Prey, held in the Savannah Arena. The bird that stood out for me during this display was the striated caracara. It has a completely different feeding habit for a bird of prey and is rather intelligent; it feeds mainly on the ground and will turn over objects to find food and look down burrows. This was demonstrated with food placed under upturned flowerpots; the caracara ran between the pots tossing them in the air and retrieving the food underneath. Later in the display they had five vultures and ten black kites up in the air together giving a real taste of life in the savannah. (Definition of a bird of prey; uses the sharp talons on the feet to kill.)



There are good numbers of fieldfares and redwings about now. The weather has not yet been cold enough for them to seek out the windfall apples in the garden. I think there are still berries in the hedgerows and food out in the fields. The blackbirds have been pitching into the pyracanthas and cotoneaster on the fence at the front of the house. Natural food resources are at their lowest in the early months of the year and that is when feeding the birds can be a life saver as well as being an enjoyment.

Warminster Rural Policing current focus

OP ARTEMIS - Poaching and Hare Coursing. Rural and remote locations and farms around Warminster and surrounding villages are at risk from Poachers damaging fences and gates to access land to Hare Course and Poach. This sometimes leads to cattle and sheep escaping out onto the roads causing issues for motorists and for the farmers. Crops and fields are also being damaged. We are conducting pro-active patrols to reduce this type of crime.

Theft from Motor Vehicles There has been a small increase in the targeting of particularly work vans and vehicles parked up overnight in Westbury and Warminster, and across wider West Wiltshire. They are broken into and work tools and equipment stolen. It is likely the offenders are using a van sized vehicle themselves to travel around and commit these crimes and using tools to damage locks to gain access. We have been conducting high visibility pro-active patrols to reduce offences and to try to identify potential offenders. As a part of crime prevention advice, we are asking people not to leave valuable items such as tools and equipment in vehicles, ensure they are securely locked and preferably alarmed. Report to the police any suspicious activity or vehicles in your area. Consider using CCTV covering property and driveways.

Youth ASB in the Town Centre There has been a small rise in reports of ASB from youths in the Town Centre at weekends and after school hours. We are taking pro-active steps to patrol and disperse groups causing issues, and where appropriate taking young people home and engaging with parents/guardians to address their behaviour. Please report any incidents on 101 when you see an incident happening.

Unoccupied home insurance cover

Planning a month in the sunshine during the winter? Make sure you have informed your home insurance provider! Did you know that a long holiday, or even a stint in hospital, could void your home insurance? Most people pay for home insurance each year, but what many people fail to realise is that leaving your house empty for as little as 30 days can mean insurers will not pay out. There could be many reasons why a property is left empty: going away on holiday, spending time in a care home/hospital, between tenants, splitting time between multiple homes. Any one of these reasons could put you at risk if the worst happens and the house is damaged while unoccupied. Going into winter homes are most at risk of water damage from burst pipes and flooding so be sure to check the Terms and Conditions of your home insurance contract if you plan to be away for a prolonged period. Sometimes the house being empty is not planned and it may not be the first thing you think of but make sure you consider the implications.

What can you do? Be aware of the terms of your individual policy. Generally, so long as you contact your provider, there are ways around the issue. Many insurance providers will cover the property if it is visited once a week, or allow you to pay a top up to continue cover.
