It's June and summer is here! The weather fluctuated between warm and cold when we enjoyed an amazing Rogation Sunday, at last it had become more predictable and our farmers can catch up after one of the latest springs in memory. Nature has a great capacity to recover so we hope this summer is no exception.

When I looked for a theme early in May, the news was full of the consequences of the misuse of Facebook personal data. Those of you not interested in social media may now be heading to the waste bin with this page! Until recently, I was firmly of the same view, but reluctantly became a user of Facebook, in order to be able to share Church information with those who don't perhaps read local magazines. I was not in favour of such 'new fangled' pastimes, and critical of younger people being welded to their smart phones! Having become a Facebook user, I was convinced I would never get sucked into that sort of behaviour! But I was wrong and subsequent weeks saw me constantly looking at all the activities and news being generated on the village Facebook site. My email inbox became full of 'have you seen' messages increasing the pressure to look. This demanded action; having stopped these random emails, some semblance of normality has descended again on the Buick household!

What possible relevance can this have to us as Christians and the life of our churches? Given our recent discussions across the Benefice, looking at what the future holds for us, many of the conclusions confirm what Pauline has long been urging us to do. We have no future unless we connect with the whole community, particularly our newer generations. The recent Good Friday Messy Church in St Philip and St James' Church was a perfect example of this. Young families picked up news of the event on social media placed there by one of our marvellous supporters. The result was amazing! We found ourselves running out of materials as a large number of young families had a great experience enjoying both the activities and the service which followed. Quite simply we had communicated in the right 'language'.

This is not a plea to turn our backs on the traditions of our Christian heritage. One of the joys for me leading school assemblies is using the traditional Lord's Prayer. We live in a Benefice which encompasses everything good about village life. The closeness allowing us all to care for each other combines with diversity, celebrating the full spectrum of worship, including 1662 services alongside newer forms. The events in Acts chapter 2 describe the Holy Spirit coming at Pentecost embody God's message of inclusiveness with the multinational crowd surrounding the Disciples, hearing his word in their own languages. Summer village events like the Crockerton street party and the Chapmanslade village explorer trail day give us opportunities to connect with each other in the best possible way. Pauline's wish for 'the community to be at the heart of the church' has never been more apt as we look to the future.

CROCKERTON VILLAGE COMMITTEE

Please help cover Crockerton in Poppies
to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War.
The Committee aim to cover the village in poppies!

A pattern is provided below for knitted and crochet poppies, or they could be made from paper, felt or any other materials. Place them in your front garden, on your gates, front doors, porch etc. To contribute to the main village display please contact the committee or Marion 213739 before mid September.

Knitted Poppies Pattern

Using 4mm needles cast on 120 stitches in red DK wool. Knit 4 rows in garter stitch. Next row - knit 3 together to the end of row (or slip 1, knit 2 together, pass slipped stitch over). Knit 4 rows in garter stitch (if you would like to knit the centre, change to black wool and ignore instruction about button etc.) Next row - knit 2 together to end of row. Knit 4 rows in garter stitch. Next row - knit 2 together to end of row. Fasten off last 10 stitches by threading the wool through the remaining stitches and sewing up the side. Sew black button or wool to create a centre.

Crocheted Poppies Pattern

4.5 hook. Ch3, join with slip stitch to form circle. Ch3, work 9dc into centre of circle and join with slip stitch. Work three petals separately. Petal 1: Ch3, work 1st dc into same stitch, work 2dc into each of the next 3 stitches Ch1, work 2sc into each stitch, tie off. Petal 2: Work 2dc into last dc of previous petal, work 2dc into each of the next 3 stitches Ch1, work 2sc into each stitch, tie off. Petal 3 as second.

Nature Notes

The countryside has undergone a dramatic transformation in the past month. After a long winter, spring has finally arrived and even verged into summer with record temperatures over the early May Bank Holiday. The vegetation has shot up and everywhere is lush and green. There is blossom in the hedgerows and on the fruit trees. Standing under the apple tree up the garden the smell was lovely and I could hear, and see, the bees at work. I was watching a swallow from under the tree; I am hoping that it is one of 'ours' returned to use the stables. It returned on 12th May, about a month later than last year. It looks to be a male as it has long streamers. The males usually arrive first to secure a nesting site. We have a house martin already in one of the nests at the front, there were 4 house martins flying around on the 10th May arriving before our swallow. Most years the swallows arrive late March/early April and the house martins the second week of May.

The bluebells were looking lovely in Southleigh Woods last week. After a warm afternoon their aroma was locked under the canopy of trees and was heavenly. I think there were more blooms this year; due to the late spring the canopy was not so thick with most trees still not in full leaf. The hedgerows and verges have been covered in the frothy white flower of cow parsley, or Queen Anne's lace; we have some in the garden which are great for insects. The rise in temperature means there are a lot of insects, just right for the summer migrants to feast on. I have seen many orange tip butterflies; it is only the male with the orange tip on the forewings, the female is basically white with black tips instead of orange. The eggs are laid on several common plants; cuckoo flower, honesty and garlic mustard (Jack by the hedge). I have also seen a few beautiful blue butterflies, quite small, possible holly blue. I rescued a couple of small tortoiseshell butterflies from the garage, when they woke up from hibernation, and a queen wasp. Most years I would have set free numerous queen wasps and certainly more than 2 small tortoiseshells, so the winter has definitely had an effect.



In the pond the tadpoles are growing but yet to show any signs of hind limbs. We are sure they have been reduced in number by ducks, heron and the resident goldfish. I think once the tadpole reaches a certain size it is less palatable to the fish. The kingfisher is missing so far. I have not spotted one here or on the river for a while, perhaps another victim of the long winter but we are seeing grey and pied wagtail.

Quite a few young blackbirds are being fed. When it was cold I started feeding sultanias which the adults readily took and now the youngsters have got a taste for them too. I can hear that there are young house sparrows up in the swift box but at least the box is being used. We have a rather smart cock pheasant who has attracted three ladies (hens) and they strut around the garden and field. Finally, we have had a handsome male bullfinch on the sunflower hearts; never having had one at the feeders before, here or at the farm, they are usually so shy. He is a welcome addition.

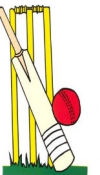

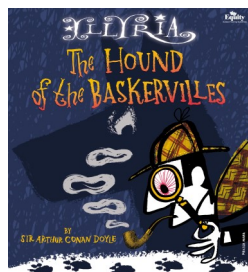

The Longbridge Deverill annual defibrillator awareness session was very well attended and Cllr Sawyer thanked all those that came along and The George for hosting.

Wiltshire Council Section 14(1) Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 temporary closure of A350 (Part), Longbridge Deverill, Brixton Deverill & Chicklade Ref TTRO 5360). Notice is given that Wiltshire Council has made an Order to close temporarily to all traffic: A350 (Part), Longbridge Deverill, Brixton Deverill and Chicklade; from its junction with A36 to its junction with A303. **To enable:** Tarmac to undertake carriageway reconstruction works including resurfacing, ironwork adjustment and road markings. **Alternative route:** via A36 – A303 and vice versa. **The closure and diversion route will be clearly indicated by traffic signs.** This Order will come into operation on 18th June, it is anticipated the closure will be required 24 hours daily until 13th July 2018. It is anticipated the works will take the stated time to complete depending upon weather conditions. Access will be maintained for residents and businesses where possible, delays are likely. Mere Historical Society

Tuesday 19th June the outing to Mottisfont Abbey and Garden (National Trust) is fully booked but for those who have booked the coach leaves Salisbury Street car park at 9.30 am and returns by around 6.00 pm

Wednesday 18th July there is a visit to Chavenage House and Tetbury. Before reaching Chavenage House we will stop in Tetbury where you will have time for lunch and to meander down the medieval cobbled Chipping Steps where the 'Mop Fairs' were held. The Heritage Centre is in the original Court House and contains a Police Museum with free entry. After lunch we will visit Chavenage House, a Grade I listed building, which is a beautiful Elizabethan house of mellow Cotswold stone built in 1576 by Edward Stephens. Only two families have owned it, and we will be shown round by one of the current owners. We leave Salisbury Street Car Park at 9.00 am and return around 6.00 pm.
