Dear Friends.

The unfolding seasons of the year are one of the great joys of living in this country I think and similarly I really enjoying the unfolding of the church's year, a year whose colours and themes echo and embrace the earth's seasons.

On the 1st day of March we begin the solemn six-week season of Lent with a service of penitence and ashing on Ash Wednesday. I don't think the word 'penitence' features very heavily in our collective vocabulary these days, but whether you believe in God or not there is something incredibly powerful and cathartic about acknowledging our past failings in ritual action and committing ourselves to a given time of deeper attention and reflection.

The ancient rite of the 'imposition ashes' – marking the sign of the cross in oil and ash on penitents' fore-heads – is an incredibly powerful and moving moment and the words that accompany it are equally powerful: 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ'. Crikey, pretty heavy stuff,

isn't it? But in our achingly beautiful, sad old broken world anybody can see that as human beings we have not made a very good job caring for the created order, nor for each other. A reminder that we are 'but dust' is no bad thing I feel because it is a reminder that we are not the centre of the universe and we need to take responsibility for our actions if we are to go any way towards building a better world. There is another word in there that we rarely use outside of church, 'sin'. Now I would be the first person to say that the Church has been a bit too focused on sin over the centuries to the detriment of God's message of grace and love. But a bit of self-examination and a realisation of our own shortcomings before we get to the Easter promise of resurrection and hope is no bad thing. One of the prayers in the service talks about God rescuing us from 'the chaos of sin'; we do need rescuing from the mess we create, do we not?

It is good to gather together to discuss our thoughts and feelings so as usual over Lent we will be running our Lent Course. This year we will be using a course entitled 'Christ and the Chocolaterie' which was inspired by

the film 'Chocolat'. We will be using clips from the film to stimulate our discussions about God, the world and ultimately what it means to be human. And yes I know traditionally people give up chocolate for Lent; personally I have never found that a very helpful thing to do as I then spend the whole time desperately craving it which is totally counter productive. Rather, I prefer to do something positive to deepen my relationship with God or think of something really lovely to do for people who are not so well. Do come along and join in, you don't have to have come to church, we would love to see you, and there will be chocolate themed refreshments on offer too.

Nature Notes

The birds are beginning to sing as the days are getting longer. Robins are very vocal early morning and late evening. The blackbirds are starting to sing too, so is the song thrush and the melodious mistle thrush. On brighter warmer days the tits are singing a little. All the singing is a bit subdued as if spring is on hold and it feels as if it is:

All the singing is a bit subdued as if spring is on hold and it feels as if it is; once the weather warms up everything will shift up a gear. I have been looking in the pond to see if any toads are about. So far I have not spotted any but I am sure it will not be long.

The ducks are coming to the pond daily, usually just one pair but this morning we had two, one of the drakes was quite distinctive with a white bib; I had not seen him before. We spotted the usual pair mating at the beginning of the month which seemed rather early. They have got used to me now and don't fly off so readily; they realise when I appear the feeders get topped up and so the ground below becomes interesting! The kingfisher has visited on a few occasions but I don't think he has had any success with the fish still being down in the depths of the pond. I have seen a kingfisher on quite a few occasions on the bank of the little stream by the garage.

The feeders are still attracting good numbers of goldfinches, greenfinches and chaffinches though the latter tend to feed more on the ground. We had a male siskin at the end of January but I have not seen it again; I have not seen brambling either yet. The fat balls have attracted long-tailed tits; we were having a party of six or more but now tend to have just a pair coming. Long-tailed tits pair up early and so these must be a local couple. I have recently been putting out suet pellets and they are attracting blue and great tits; took them a while to go to the feeder but anything new always does. We have got quite a few house sparrows about too, sadly no tree sparrows.



The green woodpecker has been feeding often in the garden and been very vocal telling me off if I have disturbed it, but we have only seen a male great spotted woodpecker on the odd occasion. Fieldfares and redwings together with blackbirds are still coming in to feed on the fallen apples. They feed very efficiently on them just leaving the hard skin and core like a skeleton on the ground.

We have had two unwelcome visitors to the garden; mole and badger. Both have done damage but they are only looking for food! Looking around the area I see a lot of badger digging and molehills so we are not alone. The molehill soil is lovely and fine and quite useful in the garden.



Walking out on the farmland nearby I have seen and heard lots of yellowhammers; they make a twittering call when in flocks, as well as the "little bit of bread and no cheese" call of the male. The bright yellow head of the male bird shows up very well especially as they usually perch in a prominent position to call at the top of a bush in the hedgerow. The other afternoon out walking I spotted a bird of prey in the distance on the brow of the hill. I thought at first it was a kestrel but its flight pattern (low down and no hovering) and size didn't match. When it landed on a fence post I could see it was smaller. I am pretty sure it was a merlin, our smallest bird of prey.

Deverill Valley Raptor & Owl Nest Box Project 2016

Early in the 2016 season, I thought the Deverill Raptor and Owl Group would be reporting a poor breeding year from its nest box project. Although in April and May there were adult barn owls in many of the regularly successful boxes, there was no sign of egg laying, suggesting the females had not reached sufficient body weight to produce eggs. The winter was mild but spring was cold with plant life slow to generate. The barn owls favourite food, vole, was in short supply. Gradually most pairs got going and I can report an averagely reasonable year for the Deverill Valley barn owls, not our best but far from our worst. Generally our broods were smaller, 6 boxes produced 15 barn owlets: 11 female and 4 male. Many boxes, which in good years will host breeding pairs, remained empty or used by stock doves or jackdaws. Sadly 1 female was found drowned in a water trough and a male found dead, probably from starvation [report from Predatory Bird Monitoring Scheme]. He was ringed as a pullus in 2012 in Hill Deverill and found dead under a nest box on Lower Pertwood Farm, close to Monkton Deverill in November 2016. He is likely to be the male of the pair who had raised a brood of 3 in the same barn earlier in the season. He was 4 years old; the average age of the demise of wild barn owls. The weather was not inclement at the time he died and there was food around. Life is hard for barn owls in the wild.



We did well with kestrels in 2016 with 9 young being raised in 3 boxes. Another pair came tantalizingly close to using one of our boxes. 'Courting' behaviour was observed over a few weeks, we were sent a picture of one of the kestrels in the box, but sadly no eggs or young. Hopefully the pair found a natural site nearby.

A pair of little owls used a box but sadly it was predated and no young were raised. We had one tawny owlet fledge from our boxes in 2016 [compared with 6 in 2014 and 7 in 2015], possibly due to restricted food supply early in the season or natural sites being used, as tawnies were heard calling throughout Deverill Valley.

The barn owl species has been moved from medium to low risk of conservation concern in the most recent listing, *Birds of Conservation Concern 4 [BoCC4]* in this country, this is undoubtedly due to the success of nest box schemes, so it is a pleasure and a privilege to be able to help in some small way. Worryingly, tawny owls have moved from low to medium risk in BoCC4; a few more tawny owl boxes needed, I think! Fingers crossed for the 2017 season.





Fund raising for Crockerton Defibrillator

This year Crockerton Village Committee are raising funds to purchase a defibrillator to be situated at the Bath Arms, Crockerton. If enough funds are raised a second defibrillator would be bought and sited at Shearwater Lake (subject to Longleat's permission). This will benefit our local community, including the primary school, visitors to the village, the pub and Shearwater Lake.



Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) is a leading cause of premature death but with immediate treatment many lives can be saved. SCA occurs because the electrical rhythm controlling the heart is replaced by a chaotic disorganised electrical rhythm called ventricular fibrillation (VF). The quicker VF can be treated by defibrillation the greater the chance of successful resuscitation. Seconds count. Having close access to a defibrillator will increase chances of survival. South West Ambulance Service offer a package which provides a defibrillator for £2,160 (this includes maintenance, replacement equipment and an annual awareness session) a second defibrillator would cost £1000. We are applying for grants but will also be relying on donations from local residents. £725 has already been raised from the village quiz night, raffle, donation pot (at the Bath Arms) and carol service. A resident has made a generous donation, owing his life to the close access of a defibrillator. We hope if you have not already made a donation you can contribute to the fund raising in any way you can. Pennies and pounds count, please put donations into the 'pot' at the pub, hand to a committee member or through the door at Orchard Cottage, 112 Clay Street. We hope that no one ever has to need to use this equipment but I am sure we would all like to see lifesaving equipment situated close by should it ever be needed.

Prior to the Parish Council meeting on Monday 6th February The Avenue Surgery Patient Group gave a presentation about the surgery, explaining current issues with GP practices, looking at the new website, and spoke about the Patient Group answering questions from 20 residents present.



The Parish Council meeting followed, it was reported Openreach updated the Parish Council on 3rd January regarding Fibre Broadband and stated 'We are currently re-surveying / planning the fibre route from Warminster to Crockerton, to look at improvements in the way we deliver fibre that will help us overcome the issues that have prevented delivery of Superfast broadband to the village. Over the next few weeks, you can expect to see some activities in the area. Once we know what can be done, we will be touch in with a better idea of the timelines involved.' The Openreach website has stated Crockerton to be at the Connect stage since 3rd January which indicates connection typically within 4 months. The Parish Council will continue to pursue the matter on a regular basis.

The Parish Plan is now complete and will be delivered to each household by end of March, please contact the Clerk if you do not receive yours. There were five applications for grants approved with payments being presented at the Annual Parish Meeting on 11th April. There will be a Parish Council Planning meeting on Monday 6th March 2017.

The next Full Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 3rd April. The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on **Tuesday 11th April**, this is a meeting of the parish electors who may contribute to the Agenda, should you wish to do so please contact the clerk by Thursday 30th March. Recipe: Chicken with Asparagus and Tarragon Sponsored by Maiden Bradley Community Shop

4 skinless chicken breast **Ingredients:** 500g baby potatoes, halved

1 tbsp sunflower oil 2 garlic cloves, crushed small bunch tarragon

1 large onion, chopped 350ml chicken stock 175g asparagus, trimmed

3 tbsp crème fraîche

Method: Cook the potatoes in a large pan of boiling water for 8-10 minutes until tender, drain and keep warm in the pan. Season chicken with ground black pepper. Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan. Gently fry chicken with onion and garlic for 5 minutes until lightly browned. Turn over chicken and stir onion regularly. Pour over stock, add 2 sprigs of tarragon, simmer gently. Cook for 5 minutes, turn chicken, add asparagus and cook for 3 minutes. Chop remaining tarragon. Stir crème fraîche and remaining tarragon into pan with chicken and heat through, stirring, for a few seconds. Serve with the new potatoes.

It is important that everyone who is eligible joins the Roll in order that the membership is truly representative of the Parish.

It is also helpful to the clergy to keep in touch with church members and to offer appropriate pastoral care.
