Dear Friends,

My youngest child is now 31, but September will always be associated in my thoughts with new beginnings; with new, pristine school uniforms, with the nervous anticipation of getting to know a new teacher. But the thing that I associate with September more than anything else, and still gives me a slight lurch of panic when I think about it, is the purchase of new shoes. Having to buy four children a new pair of shoes was a huge expense, not to mention the actual awfulness of trying to find shoes that fitted and did not offend the sensibilities of the children, who had I may say, precise and exacting standards. Being a good mummy I did what was advised and bought my children good shoes, namely leather Startrite ones and had them properly fitted at a proper shoe shop. This was all well and good when they were little and still thought I was the fount of all knowledge. Sadly, by the time they reached their mid teens these children with beautiful unmarked feet refused to cow tow to the dictates of their mother and chose their own footwear: need I say more. A couple of years ago I happened to notice my youngest daughter's feet which sadly, bore the marks of many an ill fitting shoe, I could have cried when I remembered the trouble I went to in caring for those feet.

We are all born with beautiful feet and there is something infinitely moving about a new born baby's, so tiny and perfect, so unmarked by the necessities of life and its demands. As brand spanking new human beings we arrive to inhabit lives that will mould us and mark us. Sometimes we will make good and healthy choices; sometimes choices that scar us, that twist us, to go back to the image of new shoes: that give us blisters or bunions. Sometimes through no fault of our own life itself bends us in ways that cause us to cry out at the unfairness of it all. But that beautiful, unique, divinely formed person is still there. I like to think that when God looks at us her precious children - and yes she may weep at the terrible choices we make sometimes and the damage we inflict on ourselves and our fellow human beings - she sees us, really sees us with all the mess and mucked upness of our lives, and in her eyes we are perfect and beautiful still. It is actually really hard for us to see ourselves the way God sees us, it is much easier to beat ourselves up as terrible failures than believe that we are precious, beautiful and loved.

All this makes me think of George Herbert's wonderful, wonderful poem, 'Love (111)' which starts 'Love bade me welcome'. I haven't got room to write it out here but do go and read it, it is exquisite.

So enjoy September! Good luck with shoe buying and the start of a new term.

Nature Notes

The countryside is beginning to look a bit greener with the rain but it is still rather tired looking. Grass is short, hopefully we will have a long autumn to compensate for the lack of fodder. Crops are poor without the rain to fill the grain and there is little straw. The winter needs to be mild otherwise the food situation will be desperate.

I am still feeding mealworms and sultanas and putting out the usual amount of food in the feeders. I would normally think of reducing the food about now, but they are taking everything so readily that it indicates food is short out in the countryside. I have still got young blackbirds being fed and house sparrows, and this morning I had young goldfinches on the feeders begging for food from their parents. The young goldfinches don't have the red on the head like the adults and are generally less bright in colour. We have still got young house sparrows in a nest box close to fledge, I think that is quite a late brood. The house sparrows and blackbirds would appear to have had a very good breeding season judging by their numbers in the garden.

Families of long tailed tits come to the fat balls and peanuts, such pretty little birds (flying teaspoons), and a pair of bullfinches feed outside the window on sultanas and mealworms affording us great views.

The swallows in the stable have a second brood, we managed to count 3 heads around the edge of the nest, there would have been another but I found a dead chick on the stable floor about 10 days ago. An artificial house martin nest at the front of the house is on its second brood, with busy parents flying in and out. House martins are also going in and out of the swift box at the back of the house and last night I could hear cheeping sounds coming from within. I would love to know how they are organising the interior of the nest to suit their needs. It has been previously used by house sparrows so I think they may have laid eggs in the cup of the old nest. The entrance hole is quite big and opens downwards, the box itself is miles bigger than they would normally have and I am a bit concerned how the young will cope.

The young great spotted woodpeckers are not coming to the peanuts much now.



We had a young green woodpecker in the garden with an adult male about 3 weeks ago. We rarely see the magpies now either, thankfully as they were disturbing the other birds. The poorly young magpie, I mentioned last month, sadly died. Young jays were coming to the feeders too and they also upset the smaller birds.

The kingfisher is visiting the pond most days now, it is the adult male with a black bill. The female has a lower orange/red bill (wears lipstick). There have been dragonflies and damselflies on and around the pond on sunny days. A week ago I did the Big Butterfly Count and was disappointed by the number I recorded. There were a fair number of whites but little else. The buddleia should have been covered in butterflies but I only counted a handful. I am sure the long hard winter will have affected the overwintering species (peacock, small tortoiseshell, red admiral, brimstone).

Antisocial Behaviour (ASB) This is an broad term used to describe day to day incidents having an impact on people's lives. It is often a combination of both crime and nuisance and because ASB includes such a wide range of behaviours, it means One team one team including the police, local councils and social housing landlords.

ASB can include: Rowdy and noisy behaviour; Night time noise from properties and gardens; Threatening and drunken behaviour; Vandalism and graffiti; Drug dealing and drug taking; Litter and fly tipping rubbish; Begging; Street drinking.

What can the Police do? The police and local agencies have a number of powers available to them, in order to tackle ASB. Each situation is different, however we will usually issue words of advice and / or a warning letter initially. We also have the following powers available to us: Civil Injunction; Criminal Behaviour Order; Dispersal Power; Community Protection Notice; Public Spaces Protection Order; Closure Order. Local Authorities deal with: Abandoned vehicles; Graffiti; Damage to public property; Rubbish and fly tipping; Noise, inc. loud music, noisy neighbours, parties and animals; Animal complaints contact the dog warden; Civil Injunctions, Community Protection Notice, Public Spaces Protection Order, Closure Order and Criminal Behaviour Orders. How you can report antisocial behaviour: From the list above, establish which agency is best placed to deal with your complaint. You can contact Wiltshire Council by phone 0300 4560100 or via the Wiltshire Council App. You can contact Wiltshire Police by phone 101, or 999 in the case of an emergency.

Logs: When trying to deal with ASB it is helpful to have logs of when and where the problems are occurring, details, descriptions, names of those involved and witnesses.


