

#### **Dear Friends**

#### **New Beginnings and Fruitfulness**

September is a bumper month of birthdays for my family, including my own. As a child I used to feel a bit envious of my friends who had birthdays during the school term while mine being very early in the month was in holiday time. At least I was never 'bumped' in the playground! Following my birthday would be the return to school and a new academic year. I



wonder how many 'new years' we can have in a year? In Western society we think of 'new year' as the progression from 31st December to Ist January while other cultures and calendars, particularly Eastern ones, have their's at other times. September is the beginning of the ecclesiastical year in the Eastern Orthodox Church while ours begins with Advent, four Sundays before Christmas Day. In the Jewish Faith new year begins in the month of Tishri, (the 7th month) covering part of September and October, with a festival called New Year Trumpets or Rosh Hashanah, which translates as 1st or 'head of the year' marking the start of the Jewish High Holy Days leading up to Yom Kippur (Day of Atonement). It's all about making fresh starts.

September was originally the 7th month, from the Latin septem, 'seven', March was the 1st month of the year until about 451 BC when January and February were added to the Julian Calendar, September became the 9th month, but retained its name. Many things begin again in September in tandem with the new school year, when pupils and students take another step on the ladder of education. Perhaps this September, more than any other, all of us are feeling ready to embark on a new beginning. Learning to live freely again as restrictions are lifted, maybe not as easy as we might have first imagined. I wonder what you will be leaving behind, never to return to; and what you will be looking forward to taking up again? What does a fresh start mean for you?

Covid-19 has not gone away but we can live responsibly and get going again. Looking around our garden it is obvious while we might have been restricted in our comings and goings, the fruit trees and bees have carried on as usual and there is much fruit to be picked over the coming weeks. We look to a time of harvest and giving thanks for the abundant generosity of God's love in creation, for the increase of community spirit during lockdown and we pray it will not be lost as we begin again. To the community of the church in Galatia the apostle Paul wrote: the fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. We have learned people matter more than possessions; when Jesus the Son of God lived among us, He exemplified a loving and generous way of living; it is a way of life that bears fruit, fruit that will last and fruit that is to be shared.

With love and prayers for the Holy Spirit's fruit to remain among us, always.

#### Come and join the Friends of Salisbury Cathedral!



The Friends of Salisbury Cathedral is a charity which has been giving grants to Salisbury Cathedral since 1930. Recent projects have included new level access to the cathedral and installation of live streaming equipment enabling services to be broadcast live to the cathedral's



YouTube channel during the national lockdowns of 2020 and 2021 when the cathedral was closed. These grants have been made possible thanks to members' subscriptions, donations and legacies.

Annual subscriptions are £25 for a single membership and £40 for joint membership. Members receive a Friends' membership card, entitling them to visit the cathedral free of charge (excluding ticketed events or concerts). They receive newsletters and an annual report and invitations to events: musical evenings, talks, theatre performances, holidays and annual Friends' Day. This year Friends' Day is on Saturday 25th September in the cathedral. The AGM is followed by a lecture by journalist and author Christopher Somerville, speaking about his book Ships of Heaven – The Private Life of Britain's Cathedrals. Following the lecture, members can enjoy afternoon tea in the cloisters, a short organ recital and evensong. #### Rt Hon Dr Andrew Murrison MP - 'Rural Rides'

During the last week of July, I set off on a tour of 32 of South West Wiltshire's smaller parishes and villages on what I call my 'Rural Rides' (with apologies to William Cobbett, the nineteenth century pamphleteer). From Tollard Royal in the south to Bulkington in the north, I set up in village halls - I have so many of these great buildings in my constituency I thought I would write a book about them when I have time dedicated perhaps to Cobbett – but also pubs and churches.



On Wednesday 28th, I visited Monkton Deverill, Longbridge Deverill and Crockerton. I am very grateful to the Bells, John Lea and Ted flint who organised and hosted my visit to Longbridge Deverill and the Upper Deverills and to the respective village halls. In Crockerton I set up my stall in the Lakeside Garden Centre café, thank you to Steve Cripps and his staff for arranging that. It was good to see people enjoying the lakeside setting in the sun.

Of course, I am regularly in touch with residents in Crockerton and the Deverills to discuss a wide variety of issues. But, with Covid having halted so much face-to-face interaction over the last 18 months, I felt it was important to get out and about, re-establish a presence, and meet people who might otherwise find it difficult to come and see me.

Across the constituency, the biggest issue was roads - with heavy traffic topping the bill. Everyone knows I cannot magic it away, but I can make the issue more prominent with those who may be able to help. That is how MPs work, and even sometimes change things, using whatever tools we have — meetings in high places, phone calls, tub-thumping, letters and, whisper it, the media. This trend was true in the Deverills, where traffic has eroded road verges over the years and where overgrown hedgerows and plants conceal road signs or markings. This low-cost unkept look seems to be favoured by the council under the guise of rewilding but it should be balanced with road safety not merely neglected. Residents here and elsewhere have suggested that adding wildflowers to more unsightly traffic islands or roundabouts would be consistent with the Council's re-wilding theme. I agree that there is nothing more lovely than a show of native wildflowers, but all too soon it goes over and becomes a mess.

Thank you again to those who turned out. Hopefully the success of the vaccine roll out means another fixture will be possible soon.

#### **Nature Notes**

The garden is now quiet, there are hardly any birds around and the only bird singing is the robin occasionally. Robins hold territory all year round so need to stake their claim by singing



throughout the seasons. All the birds are keeping a low profile, staying under cover as they are moulting and are not able to fly as well so are more vulnerable to predation. Several of my regular blackbirds look really moth eaten! After many months of breeding with a lot of work and stress to feed their young, the feathers need to be changed ready for winter. I do hear and see a few birds. Yesterday evening when I was out near the feeders a mixed party of tits came in to dine. It was the continual calling of the long-tailed tits amongst the group that made me aware of them. There must have been at least eight of the long tailed with slightly less great and blue tits. Birds often make up mixed feeding groups at this time of the year; helps in the finding of food and there is safety in numbers. The other bird I am hearing and seeing on the feeders is the bullfinch, usually the male but sometimes with a female and occasionally several males together. They too look rather moth-eaten, their usual stunning contrasting plumage is not nearly as bright.



It appears to be a very good year for butterflies. We have a buddleia bush at the top of the garden and it has been covered in them on bright sunny days, more than I have see for quite a few years. Peacocks seem to dominate, but there are also good numbers of red admirals and small tortoiseshells. One day I saw

a fritillary, probably silver-washed, also a comma and a brimstone along with several meadow browns and whites. We are often having to release a butterfly from the garage or conservatory which indicates good numbers. I wonder if with the lock down and a lot less traffic, there were fewer butterflies (along with other insects) killed on the roads and perhaps this is being reflected in the increase in numbers this year.

We are not sure what is going on with the swallows in the stables. We thought they were sitting again but there doesn't appear to be any activity in the nest now. I have a feeling it may have been predated, if so, a magpie is top of the list as I saw one behaving suspiciously on the stable roof near the nest. I check the stables each day hoping the swallows might try again as they have only had one brood. The house martins at the front of the house also seem to be rather quiet. I know another nest fledged but it is tricky to follow what is going on as the nests are so close and they fly around so fast. They too should have time for more broods as we have still got the rest of August and all of September. It will depend very much on the weather. The blackbirds and robins have only just finished feeding young, which is quite late in the year. We still have one pair of sparrows with young in the nest in the swift box at the back of the house. Sadly, I found one chick dead on the ground about a week ago, the rest seem to be doing well, judging by the noise!
