Dear Friends,

Well here we are again in December and my mind is filled with a chaotic mish mash of thoughts about all the stuff going on at church and at home, not least the production of epic quantities of food to squirrel away in the freezer ready for when the family arrives. As I put the second chocolate roulade in the freezer basket a terrible thought occurred to me; what if the freezer broke down with all the Christmas goodies in it? It doesn't bear thinking about.



At this time of year I always feel conflicted about the whole Christmas shebang, clearly not about the actual event we are supposed to be celebrating, namely, the birth of Christ, but about the business of over consumption. I feel uneasy not just in terms of excessive food and presents, but in the myth of the perfect Christmas with a perfect turkey, perfect table settings, perfectly curated matching decorations and a perfect always smiling family to enjoy it all.

In the light of all the restrictions we were living with last Christmas maybe we have realised that perfection doesn't matter, being with the people we love is what matters. But no family is perfect, and all will have areas of conflict and tension that might well emerge when people spend a great deal of time together, mine included; someone is bound to go off in a huff, lose their temper or take exception to something or someone at some point or another.

Please spare a thought for all those who have no family to speak of or whose experience of family life is very broken and sad, and for those who have no home to decorate or friends to celebrate with; this Christmas I am acutely aware of just how privileged I am, if all I have got to worry about is my freezer breaking down then I am lucky indeed. I have been thinking about how I can hold that beautiful, essentially simple story of Emmanuel, God with us, being born to share our human life in all its joy and terrible brokenness, in tandem with the reality of the darkness and pain so evident in our world today. It is only a little thing but like many of you, I have tried to buy my Christmas crackers, cards, etc from charities I support so at least the money is contributing to something worthwhile. I did moot the idea of not having crackers but it didn't go down very well.

What I am trying to say is Christmas is wonderful but let us not forget we are immensely privileged in being able to enjoy it in the way we do. As I make my mince pies I will be praying for you and especially for those for whom the season is particularly difficult this year. I pray that whether you are busy looking after those you love or with us in church, the light of God's loving presence will be real for you this Christmas. May the peace and joy of Christmas be yours.

An uncluttered Christmas

Having just returned from leading a Diocesan pilgrimage to Iona, I am reflecting upon the rich threads which weave their way through Celtic Spirituality, including an appreciation of God's creation. A life that treads gently on the earth because God created it and gave it to us to enjoy also reflects the fifth mark of mission: To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth. COP26 provided a platform for Christians as well as other environmentalists to highlight some of the ways God's earth is being damaged beyond repair, calling us all to live simpler lives.

Advent is a time for preparation and gives all of us an opportunity to make changes to the ways we live to make the world a better place. As consumers, the temptation is to accumulate and to waste; as Christians, the call is to be generous and live as good stewards. The trappings of Christmas surround us – do we really need another special bauble for the tree? Or that glittery wrapping paper that will not easily recycle? Can we invite people in for a simple supper? Or give just one or two presents and not the usual dozen?

The first Christmas was very much a stripped-back affair. God's Son, born in simplicity, grew up to teach the same simplicity, telling us not to store up possessions, and to give things away to others. His appreciation of the birds of the air and the lilies in the field were a challenge to our own worries and anxiety about 'many things'. Therefore, let our response be to tread gently on the earth, too: pointing out to those who have influence when the decisions they take mar God's creation; preparing through a simple advent, and welcoming the Christ child in the most uncluttered way we can.

Was it our house or did we know where it might be? *The Runaways* by Victor Canning is the first part of a trilogy about a boy Smiler, who is on the run from an approved school. The first book is set around Salisbury Plain, the second, *Flight of the Grey Goose*, in Scotland and the third *The Painted Tent* in North Devon. Victor Canning (1911–1986) wrote over 60 books. The Smiler trilogy was published 1972–1974 by Heinemann and later under the Puffin imprint.

A small reminder to be vigilant and clear any drains which are your responsibility around your property. Unfortunately, Wiltshire Council do not necessarily clear all drains and gullies as a matter of course, the number one priority for the council are 'A' roads. Please continue to provide the Environment Agency with feedback by emailing floodwessex@environment-agency.gov.uk. Many of you will have registered in the past for Flood warnings. You can still call **0345 988 1188** or go on line to www.gov.uk/check-flooding. The goal of Check for flooding is "To provide timely, up to date flood information in one on line location, including local knowledge from communities and information from partners, enabling people to understand their flood risk and take action to recover from flooding." **Stay safe & take care this winter.**

Sunday morning 31st October - downpour!

We were expecting 4 guests to come and stay Sunday through to Monday. I went downstairs early to prepare a few things. I could hear the rain but carried on making some tea and toast; I could hear the rain seemed to be getting heavier. I wasn't worried, as far as I knew the cottage had never been flooded in 300 years. I went into the downstairs W.C. Opened up the



blind, there was a river running down the back of the house, the water was up to the top of the large flowerpots! I stood rooted to the spot and called my husband. We rushed to the Garden Room; water was coming in via the double doors. The next three hours or so, still in our pj's were spent bailing out the water as it seeped into the whole of the ground floor, even reaching the kitchen. Fortunately, we managed to control it with towels, buckets, mops etc. Later several people from the village turned up with offers of help.

We were lucky, apart from 2 rugs which we were not quick enough to move and some water damage we got off lightly, I dread to think what would have happened if we had been away. Three other houses at our end of the village suffered much more than us. Let us hope there will be no more freak weather conditions, however if it happens again, we will be more prepared.

Nature Notes



The redwings and fieldfares have now arrived from Scandinavia. A month ago I saw and heard a small flock of redwings for the first time, now I am seeing and hearing both species; more redwing than fieldfare. This morning I was surprised to see redwing feeding on the lawn and coming near to the house. I tend to think of them as shy birds only coming close to us when food gets short in the countryside. I had super views of them with their distinctive eye stripe and red flanks next to the wings, which gives the bird its name. They come to the pond to bathe and drink; yesterday we had a mixed flock of redwing and fieldfare there and you could clearly see the difference in size between the two species, the fieldfare being the larger bird and having a very distinctive grey head and grey rump. I love to hear the “cha-cha-check” call of the fieldfare. The redwing has a penetrating seeping call, not so easy to hear. We leave fallen apples on the ground close to the pond and I have spotted birds feeding on them already.

The woodpeckers have been quite busy in the garden. We had not seen much of the great spotted woodpeckers for a time but now both male and female are coming to feast on the fat block. The male was feeding just at the right angle for me to see the red patch on the back of the neck (absent in the female). They are making short work of it, drilling a hole which then weakens the block. Still, it’s lovely to see them. The green woodpecker has been active too. I spotted it on the summerhouse working its way around the cracks and crevices in the wood finding insects; it was very agile hanging at all angles to get the best chance of food. Then it came onto the lawn, slowly coming closer to the house. The next thing I knew it was hanging on the wall by the dining room window, then it came down onto the window ledge right in front of me and was tapping on the glass and making a noise I had not heard before. I have never been so close to a green woodpecker; it was a male (it had a red moustachial stripe standing out against it’s black face). I think it saw its reflection in the glass and thought that there was another male woodpecker. I doubt if I will ever see one that close up again.



It has been relatively mild. This morning I heard a buzzing close by the feeders and saw a honeybee on the viburnum flowers and seconds later there was a big bumblebee. While removing more invasive pondweed last week, I noticed a dragonfly laying eggs on the raft and later on I saw a red admiral butterfly. Yesterday I clearly heard and saw a male blackbird singing on a roof opposite and there was a song thrush singing in the distance. Both songs I would not expect to hear at this time of the year. All signs of climate change?
