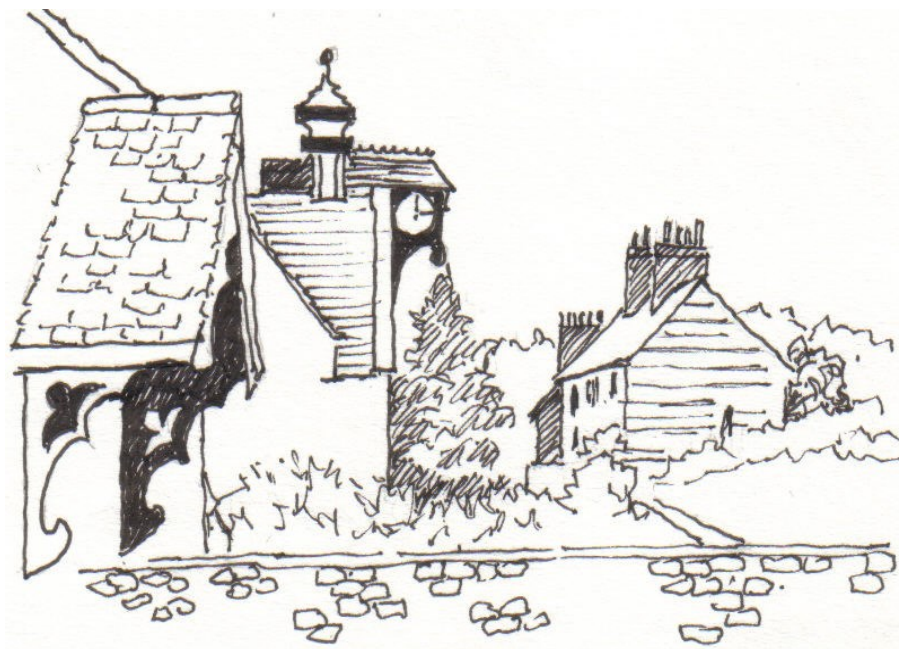

## ***Dear Friends,***

I wonder how you feel about the short, dark days of December and January? For some it is an opportunity to enjoy the longer evenings, engaging in some craft, settling down by an inviting fire, feeling warmth and comfort, maybe with a good book. For others the dark nights are too long, and they would really value some company, it is good to keep an eye out for those who might be struggling.

There is however something quite special about the dark, because there are lights that can be seen much more clearly, candle light glows brighter and stars twinkle brightly for example. In the New Testament (the second collection of books in the Bible) at the beginning of the Good News (Gospel) according to John the Apostle it says "In Him (God – specifically the Word) was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." Further on, chapter 8: verse 12 says 'When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.'

As the carol says, there are twelve days to the season of Christmas which ends with Twelfth Night, but it isn't the end of what we may term as the season of light, which in the Christian calendar runs from Advent Sunday to the last day of Epiphany and known as Candlemas.

The Epiphany, which begins on 6th January, marks the coming of those rather mysterious Magi from the East who are also called star gazers, the arrival of a new, extra bright star, is a sign to them a new king has been born. They set out on a long journey to find him and pay homage, following the light that is breaking through the darkness, guiding them to the place where Mary and Joseph are staying with the young Jesus; they kneel in awe before this tiny wonder and present their gifts – gifts for a king. The first to find Jesus were the shepherds who represent Israel – the Magi represent the non-Jewish world, we can share in their wonder, the moment of sudden and great realization that Jesus is a light which darkness can never overcome. The choice is ours – we can kneel in awe, bringing the gift of our open hearts and walk in the light, sharing it with others or we can remain in the dark, it is always our own decision, but if we do, we will miss the opportunity to be transformed, to be people of light and hope in a world that so badly needs both.



The blessing of the light of Christ be with you as we journey through to lighter days, watch for the first signs Spring is just around the corner.....

## A Letter from Bishop Andrew

Our days are filled with calls upon our time and attention. Among the least welcome are the cold sales calls which intersperse our day – those anonymous, brief exchanges with callers who address us by the name of a long-forgotten tenant of our home, and with whom no kind of even fleeting relationship is possible. Several times a week, we might rush from the bathtub, meal table or meeting to pick up the phone, only to be asked whether we are the householder - and feel our heart sink and blood pressure begin to rise.



The poor fools who work in call centres have my pity - only because I was one of them for a while. I was selling advertising for a local news paper. I found making cold calls so impossibly awkward, I even tended to depart from the usual script and began my sales pitch with 'I'm so sorry for bothering you, you probably won't want this' and 'you must feel free to say no, but I have to call you....' Just occasionally, this groveling approach actually worked, and one could have a proper conversation. I lasted but five months on the job.

Then there are other calls: calls which are so surprising, so welcome, life seems to open up with their appearance. These little epiphanies can come through the phone – in the good news of a job offer or an unexpected invitation. But, equally, they come in other ways: someone in need, for example, whose call upon our assistance somehow makes us more human; or perhaps in the form of a sudden revelation – like a film or piece of music, perhaps, which might fill us with a sense of expectancy, or expresses our yearning so deeply we are renewed. These kinds of encounters not only inspire us, but they also ask something of us and call us forward into a different way of life.

'Behold', says the risen Christ in the Bible: 'I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice, and opens the door, I will come in, and will eat with him, and he with me.' Scripture invites us to imagine Christ as an unexpected caller: one who will not barge in, but patiently waits for our response. He does not want a minute of our time, or have an unrepeatable special offer, but comes to meet us so we might follow where he will lead. The Lord's arrival in our midst is the wonder of this season: bearing the light of the world, he calls us forth. As with gladness so many have done before, may we also follow.

## The Dean of Salisbury's pilgrimage

Dean of Salisbury the Very Revd Nicholas Papadopoulos will be leading a pilgrimage through the biblical lands of Israel and Palestine from **19th - 28th April 2022**. He said "Covid-19 put paid to our plans to go on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in 2020 so I am thrilled that new dates have been identified. I made my first pilgrimage in 2016. It was quite an overwhelming experience. Since then, I have had the privilege of leading two further pilgrimages, and the prospect of returning to Israel and Palestine in 2022, after the pandemic has hopefully subsided, is very exciting."



The pilgrimage will include visits to the Sea of Galilee, Capernaum, Nazareth, Bethlehem, Jerusalem and the Dead Sea. 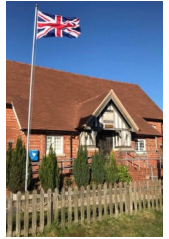

Wiltshire Council, as the local highway authority, are the lead in dealing with winter maintenance within the county. This web page [www.wiltshire.gov.uk/highways-gritting-snow-clearance](http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/highways-gritting-snow-clearance) gives information on the winter service and how Wiltshire Council deliver the service alongside partner agencies. Wiltshire weather can be unpredictable and the occurrence and severity of winter conditions varies considerably through the season and from year to year. Severe winter weather is most likely to be experienced in December, January and February but ice and snow can occur earlier or later. To take account of all possible winter weather the winter service period runs from mid-October to mid-April. ## Salisbury Cathedral Flower Festival 2022

Planning for the flower festival at the Cathedral is underway. 'Celebration', a Festival of Flowers takes place from **Tuesday 10th to Sunday 15th May** and will involve hundreds of arrangers.

It is designed by Michael Bowyer, Pam Lewis and Angela Turner, all Chelsea gold medallists. Michael, director of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers and president of the National Association of Flower Arrangement Societies (NAFAS) said everyone was saddened when the festival for 2020 was cancelled due to the pandemic.

So 2022's festival will include elements of that festival plus themes celebrating the Queen's platinum jubilee, key workers, the power of nature, the cathedral's treasures and the Church's year. Members of Salisbury Cathedral Flowers, flower clubs and churches from the Diocese have been invited to take part. It will be environmentally friendly, arrangers will be using compostable substitutes for floral foam; a section of the displays will focus on bees and other pollinators. Tickets for the 2022 flower festival are now available from Salisbury cathedral's website.



## A Rocha UK (ARUK)

A Rocha is a Christian charity working for the protection and restoration of the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment. By November 2021, more than 4,300 churches had registered as Eco Churches since its launch in 2016. This took it 'over the line' of our original ten year goal of reaching 10% of churches in England and Wales, four years early! A large number of Eco churches were represented in the 2,300 churches who held a Climate Sunday service and petitioned Government to take urgent climate action in the run-up to COP26.

We also surpassed 1,000 Eco Church awards, with the biggest jump in Gold award applications, now totalling 23 churches holding a Gold award, including the **first Gold cathedral awarded to Salisbury Cathedral** in June.

Eco Church also worshipped together. At our online service in March, we celebrated the fifth anniversary of Eco Church with our wider community of friends, partners and Eco Church members. Then, during Resound Worship's Doxecology tour throughout COP26 in November, we spent time in praise for God's wonderful creation and in prayer for the climate talks. Many Eco churches also took part in the first ever ***Churches Count on Nature*** in June which involved a week of recording wildlife in churchyards. 10,000 individuals across the country enjoyed discovering nature on their doorstep and submitted over 21,000 nature records to the national iRecord database.

Our goal is now to see 25% of the UK's churches engaging with Eco Church or sister schemes in Scotland and Ireland by 2026. So, there is much to do in the coming 12 months. We look to build on our community, shared learning and sense of togetherness as Christians helping our local churches to care for creation as part of its mission; just search #ecochurch on social media for a glimpse into the creative and practical ways churches are taking action to care for creation!

## Nature Notes

Only a few days now before we get to the shortest of the year, and with it being so cloudy they do feel very short! Still, it is very mild and today I could sense a touch of spring in the air. We had a lovely mistle thrush singing at the top of the cherry tree; a beautiful melodic song. They always choose high points to sing from which enables their song to carry a good distance. I could also hear dunnocks singing in the hedgerows and, of course, robins.



Two weeks ago it was really cold and the pond was frozen over; our weather is certainly not very settled, a nightmare for nature, it all needs to learn quickly to adjust and adapt. The moorhen and kingfisher know when to use the pond here and when it is not worth a visit. They are both coming again now, the moorhen very rarely has a day away. We have had a little egret drop in briefly too; we don't encourage them for the sake of the fish.

We had a sad discovery in the garden this morning; a young dead roe deer. We first spotted it on Monday morning feeding on the fallen apples. It didn't look that bright but was not obviously injured or distressed. It spent the day in the garden sitting down in various places and browsing on vegetation. The following day it appeared from behind the pond and again moved around nibbling vegetation. I made sure it had water in several places that were accessible rather than reaching down into the pond. At first this morning I couldn't see it and then I spotted it laying flat out amongst the bushes on the side of the pond. When I went to move it, I realised it was a young buck; I had thought it was a doe because it looked so sweet and most of the time it had been lying down. It had been scouring and it was under weight. It was probably about six months old and should have still been with its mother.



The bird feeders are attracting a lot of goldfinches and there are a good numbers of tits; blue, great and long-tailed. One day I spotted a coal tit, they are always the shyest. The female woodpecker has visited regularly but not spotted the male. A grey squirrel has also visited the feeders which I have chased away, but when checking the feeders I saw evidence of teeth marks on the sunflower heart. We may have to put the baffle on the pole of the feeder stand to try and stop it as they do so much damage with their sharp teeth.

Some evenings I have been lucky enough to see and hear a large flock of starlings passing over the village from west to east. They just seemed to keep coming, several thousands of them, the most I had seen since visiting the Somerset Levels. Maybe going to roost on Salisbury Plain or Langford Lakes.

Well just enough space for me to remind you of the **Big Garden Birdwatch from 28th to 30th January. Happy New Year.**
