Dear Friends,

I write on a perishing cold grey day; it is that time of year, when it can feel unbearably cold and miserable and spring seems a long way off, especially this year when most of us are feeling somewhat weary and worn down, and hope is sometimes hard to sustain. But, (and I suspect I write about this every February, but never mind, I do it



because it's so special) those miraculous, achingly beautiful little plants, the snowdrops, are beginning to brave the cold and push their delicate stems through the cold earth into the light. How gloriously clever of nature to give us something so exquisite just when we are wondering how we are going to get through the final months of winter.

In his poem Firelight and Nightfall D H Lawrence writes 'Here lamps are white like snowdrops in the grass.' Yes! They are like lamps lighting up these dull days and calling us to pay attention to the beauty of the natural world, to what another poet Gorge Herbert described as 'heaven in ordinary', pointing us toward hope.

Herbert's poems are prayers really, and most people at some stage or another in their lives find prayer difficult; they cannot find the right words or they feel God has deserted them, that prayer is a waste of time. Weirdly, it is often when we admit to feeling the absence of God we are actually closest to him because we have let go of our limited understanding of what that closeness looks like. In the Christian tradition there are some wonderful examples of writing in this vein, the most famous I suppose being John of the Cross, a Spanish mystic who talked of 'dazzling darkness' and the paradox of finding God where it would seem he is not.

Anyway, what is prayer? I think we define it too narrowly; we are moved by those snowdrops, we respond to that beauty, we are lifted out of our own preoccupations; is that not prayer? I have never forgotten what someone said to me, many years ago now. With four small children all under 6 I found it difficult to pray and I felt really guilty about it. Instead of telling me to go and hide myself in the airing cupboard or something this wise priest said, 'Your children are your prayer, God has given them to you, at this point in time, this is where you are, and it's ok'.

I don't know where you find yourself at this time but I wiil leave you with another poem, Prayer, by the brilliant Carol Anne Duffy, and do go to find those snowdrops.

Some days, although we cannot pray, a prayer utters itself. So, a woman will lift her head from the sieve of her hands and stare at the minims sung by a tree, a sudden gift.

Pray for us now. Grade 1 piano scales console the lodger looking out across a Midlands town. Then dusk, and someone calls a child's name as though they named their loss.

Some nights, although we are faithless, the truth enters our hearts, small familiar pain; then a man will stand stock-still, hearing his youth in the distant Latin chanting of a train.

Darkness outside. Inside, the radio's prayer - Rockall. Malin. Dogger. Finisterre.

Our churches need your help

I have undertaken the role of Treasurer of the Parochial Church Council for the Deverills and Horningsham for the past year. It has not been a year of momentous success. My first recommendation was to reduce by half the contribution we make to The Salisbury Diocese – nearly £20,000 - because we simply had to.

Fund raising efforts were curtailed because of Covid, despite which we managed to stage very successful evenings such as a Folk Night at Brixton, a Quiz night at Longbridge and a Jazz Night at Horningsham. Many people also enjoyed 2 outdoor Carol Services around Christmas. They raised nearly £2,000. The 50/50 Club raised another £1,000. Contributions towards the cost of printing the Parish News only cover the cost with the addition of the Gift Aid collected, despite nearly 150 families contributing.

Depending on the repairs necessary to keep our ancient churches in good order, our annual costs are up to £40,000 before we can think of supporting the annual cost of a resident vicar. Roughly 10% of residents of Crockerton, Longbridge and the Deverills give regularly to keep our four churches open. Over the past three years such donations have reduced by £5,000 pa, due to people leaving, dying or no longer wishing to support us. During that time, the majority of those who do support the church have not increased their contribution, although there are a few stalwarts who are very generous.

My appeal is simple.

If you think you are contributing to Parish funds by submitting blue envelopes, be assured your donations only go to pay for the Parish News. If you do give regularly, and have not revised your donation for 3 years, please do so now, we really need your help. If you are not religious, but want to take advantage of our beautiful ancient venues for baptisms, weddings or funerals, please support the **Friends of the Deverill Churches** whose sole purpose is to help to pay for essential repairs and improvements to them. 
I have agreed to do this job for two more years. I really hope that it will not be necessary to consider closing any of our churches on my watch. So if you can, please help us now. Thank you.

New Bishop of Salisbury

The Diocese is delighted to announce the Queen has approved the nomination of the Very Reverend Stephen Lake, Dean of Gloucester, as the next Bishop of Salisbury, to succeed the Right Reverend Nicholas Holtam.



Stephen trained for ministry at Chichester Theological College. He grew up in Poole, so is returning to his roots. He held his curacy at Sherborne Abbey with Castleton and Lillington and was ordained Priest in 1989. He became Vicar of St Aldhelm's, Branksome, Poole from 1992 and appointed Rural Dean of Poole in 2000. In 2001, Stephen was appointed Sub Dean of St Albans, and became Dean of Gloucester in 2011. Stephen is a Church Commissioner and Lead Dean for Safeguarding. He is married to Carol, and they have three adult children.

Acting Bishop of Salisbury, Rt Rev Karen Gorham, said she is delighted with Stephen's appointment as 79th Bishop of Salisbury. He will bring creative gifts of leadership at an important time as we continue to encourage the local church to be the best it can be, bringing hope to our local communities in sharing the love of Jesus Christ. Stephen said it is a privilege and a joy to be called back to the Diocese of Salisbury as Bishop.

Thank you letter received by Ian Meadows, PCC Treasurer, from Maureen Wollard, Warminster & District Foodbank:

On behalf of the W & D Foodbank I write to thank you for the extremely generous donation of £400 sent to Dewey House following your outdoor Carol Service at St Mary's Church, Kingston Deverill. Thank you for thinking of us, please convey our gratitude to all who took part and their support.

We have groups of volunteers working Tuesday, Wednesday and Fridays taking in donations of food and filling the bags for clients as requested. Others deliver the bags, although clients can now collect their goods if they prefer. In addition to the normal bags we distribute, we packed almost 100 extra special Christmas bags with extra goodies for those families recommended by staff at local schools and some elderly people, quite a task!

During October 3532kgs of food were donated and we fed 199 people, 132 adults and 67 children, giving out 1434kgs of food. Each month we supplement food by buying bread, eggs meat and fish using our funds and it is support such as yours that enables us to continue to do this and meet the needs of the increasing number of people who find themselves in crisis.

Once again thank you to you all, we are very grateful for your help.

Parish of the Deverills & Crockerton - Rainfall 2021

Every year, I receive rainfall details from 8 rain gauge recorders within the Parish and calculate an average figure. The Rainfall total in 2021 was 946.61MM or 37.26 inches.



I quote from the 2021 Environment Agency Rainfall Observers News Letter, 'This year (2021) the weather in Wessex provided us with the driest November, 12th driest April, 5th wettest May since records began in 1891'.

To support the statement, at Manor Farm, Longbridge Deverill I recorded, 0.56 inches of rain in April, 5.34 inches in May and 0.6 inches in November. The hottest days were June 26th when I measured 26C and a scorcher on July 22nd, when 30C occurred. The hardest frost was on February 12th when the thermometer dropped to Minus 6C. The wettest day October 20th when 1.8 inches of rain fell. The wettest month was October 7.5 inches of rain. Thanks to all weather watchers and rain gauge keepers for this information.

I conclude this report with the rainfall totals in the past two decades.

Nature Notes

Having had the warmest New Year's Day on record we then experienced temperatures below average, with hard overnight frosts and freezing fog. It is not good when it swings dramatically; we don't know what to wear and the wildlife doesn't know what to do. When it was mild, we had blue and great tits looking at the nest box on the beech tree at the front of the house. Much too early; this cold snap has put a halt to that. But it spurred us into action and we have cleaned out all the boxes. There are 9 boxes in all, 1 is a terraced house sparrow box with 3 compartments which wasn't used last year. Of the other 8

boxes, 4 were used. Great tits used the beech tree box and there were blue tits in the silver birch box in the front garden. The box on the old cherry tree in the back garden was probably used by great tits. The box on the end of the stables at the top of the garden was used by tits, great or blue, but 3 eggs were left in there which had not hatched. One other box on the wall of the house



had nesting material in it but it hadn't been pushed down to form a nest cup.

Recently, each morning, I have woken to the song of a robin singing just outside the window; lovely. With this cold snap the birds are quieter, saving energy. The robin only sings for a short while. The feeders have been busier but then the sparrowhawk notices and they all go suddenly very quiet. We have had long-tailed tits coming to the fat and the female great spotted woodpecker; a good number of goldfinches, great and blue tits, and also a pair of bullfinches, the male has ring on its leg. Food gets dropped from the feeders onto the grass and we often have pheasants and moorhens clearing up; mostly



hen pheasants, 2 at the moment but word gets around! There were 2 splendid looking cock pheasants with a hen recently. We have a pair of moorhens now; when the pond was frozen over they were not about first thing but came later in the day when the ice has thawed. There was a male green woodpecker feeding on the lawn a few days ago. The squirrel is not a welcome visitor.

There are several shrubs flowering just now, all scented. My favourite is a Mahonia japonica with a lily of the valley fragrance. There is also a Christmas box, Sarcococca humilis, in a pot at the front with a very strong vanilla fragrance. Lonicera fragrantissima also has a lovely lily of the valley scent. All these winter flowering shrubs have small flowers better able to withstand inclement weather. When the sun was out I saw several honey bees on the Christmas box and a lovely big bumblebee on the mahonia. These early flowering plants are very important for insects. Winter jasmine brightens up the garden with its yellow flowers, no smell, their forte is colour. Bulbs are poking through so we can look forward to the spring flowers.
