Dear Friends,

As I write we have been experiencing endless days of grey with unremitting heavy rain, if the sun does make an appearance, it is something to be remarked upon; a glimpse of blue sky is reason for celebration! It is that time of year when it can feel unbearably cold and miserable, and spring can feel a long way off.



Recently I had the privilege of accompanying my friend to have a scan of her baby. When I had my 4 children, I only had a scan for the youngest one born in 1987 so I was very excited to have this opportunity to be with my friend. It was incredibly moving to see the image of this tiny being up on the screen, and even more so when the radiographer highlighted the various organs in the baby's body and explained what they were. It was nothing short of miraculous that hidden in its dark and watery home a new human being was being formed. The psalmist writes: For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.

This miracle of new life is echoed in the rhythm of birth and death in the created order; despite the cold and darkness of these February days new life is being created in the dark earth. Initially we cannot see it, but then wondrously, a bulb bravely pushes its green head through the sodden soil and there, we are reminded that new life is coming. Once again I hold my breath in anticipation of seeing that most beautiful icon of hope, the snowdrop; how gloriously clever of nature to give us something so exquisite when we are wondering how we are going to get through these final months of winter. In his poem, Firelight and Nightfall, D.H. Lawrence writes: 'Here lamps are white like snowdrops in the grass.' What beautiful words, the snowdrops are like lamps lighting up these dull days and calling us to pay attention to the beauty of the natural world, to what the priest/poet George Herbert called 'Heaven in Ordinary', pointing us toward hope.

Herbert's poems are prayers really, and most people at some point in their lives find prayer difficult, they cannot find the right words or they feel that God has deserted them, that prayer is a waste of time. Weirdly, it is often when we admit to feeling the absence of God that we are actually closest to him, and anyway, words are very inadequate to express this yearning we have to reach beyond ourselves into the divine presence.

John of the Cross spoke of 'dazzling darkness'. I hope in these dark days of winter, and indeed our hurting world, you too can find beauty and hope that moves your heart to prayer as we wait for spring. Love and prayers,

Additional services available to patients 2023

Our priority is to provide a dedicated team of GPs for our patients in and around Mere. For health problems please continue to call our reception (01747 860 001) who will ensure your needs are directed to the right health professional. In 2019 our Patient Participation Group (PPG) undertook a survey of what health services our patients wanted as Mere continues to grow. The universal response was for more health and wellbeing services to be provided within Mere to reduce travel. The following additional services are now available to the patients at the Surgery

Paramedic Andy Wotton, you will recognise him in his green uniform, manages urgent and acute presentations that require being seen on the same day. Andy will also deal with patients' initial discharge from hospital, minor injuries and home visits.

Hearing Aid clinic Held on the first Thursday of the month, it offers a service to patients for retubing/cleaning hearing aids and batteries. Patients can book appointments direct by contacting Gill Drayson on 01722 580014 or 07570 670 643.

Diabetic Eye Screening A monthly clinic offering a test to check for eye problems, patients are contacted direct and to arrange an appointment at the surgery.

Specialist Diabetes Nurse clinic Monthly on the third Wednesday of each month, providing good patient care and promoting self-care management.

Breast Screening Unit In late 2022 the unit visited for a period of two weeks and resulted in some of the highest attendance figures ever recorded in Mere.

Health and Wellbeing Coaches Julia Cole works 2 days a week offering a Health and Wellbeing coaching service to support patients in making changes to their lifestyle and behaviour. Working with patients with physical and/or low-level mental health conditions to improve their health. An additional coach will join the surgery for a further 2 days a week shortly.

Elderly Care Facilitator and Age UK The Facilitator is responsible for patients over 75, and will visit them in their homes, liaise closely with families, co-ordinate services and ensure the patients' needs are met. The surgery has access to Age UK staff able to assist completing applications for benefits or accessing different services.

Care Co-ordinator They work closely with GPs in the surgery and our Elderly Care Facilitator, however they mainly focus on the key younger age group.

First Contact Physiotherapist They are based in the surgery one day a week offering to discuss musculo-skeletal problems. Following a telephone triage call, the First Contact Physiotherapist may recommend an appointment with them directly.

Pharmacy Team As Sarum West Primary Care Network, we have appointed a team of Pharmacy Technicians to assist with monitoring medications. The team work remotely accessing patient records to ensure best practice for patients.

Online services Patients can now use Airmid, a new App to access the surgery's online services, it is an alternative to NHS App / System Online. It does not replace usual methods to contact the surgery, book appointments or request prescriptions.

Women's Health We continue to hold specific clinics for Women's Health on a weekly basis dealing with matters such as contraception, menopause and HRT.



Upper Deverills Parish Council 20 mph zones feasibility

The Parish Council have been working closely with the Traffic Engineering team at Wiltshire Council to identify whether there are any stretches of the B3095 which might be suitable for 20 mph zones. There are strict guidelines and restrictions which have to be met in order for a stretch of road to be considered suitable. The first stage of the process is to carry out a survey of vehicle speeds within the zones identified. The Parish Council has applied for the surveys to be conducted. It is likely to be some months before the surveys are carried out and the results known.

Upper Deverills Wildlife & Conservation Group Bird Surveys

Last year saw the completion of the first of a series of bird surveys in the Upper Deverills. The surveys targeted several farmland species



(Yellowhammer, Corn Bunting, Skylark) that are in serious decline. Through the period April to June surveys were undertaken along 12 pre-selected routes to record the presence (or absence) of these species, and each route was surveyed 3 times. A brief report and table of results has been uploaded onto the Upper Deverills Website, under 'Our Countryside'. The second series of surveys along the same routes, targeting the same 3 species, will begin in April.

Rainfall report for 2022

covered in water once again.

What a tremendous contrast from a sweltering hot lovely

summer to a soaking wet autumn and end of year. Almost a carbon copy of 1976. As I write this annual rainfall report for 2022, it is worth noting the New Year has started and in this month we have already endured just over 6 inches of rain by today's date Saturday January 14th 2023. However, the water meadows are doing what they were designed to do, and it is a great sight to see them

The team of 8 rainfall recorders has supplied me with its results and the average rainfall, over 8 sites within the parish, reveals the rainfall for 2022 was almost bang on the average at 35.38 inches.

The hottest days were June 18th, when we recorded 29C, followed by a scorching hot July peaking at 32C on July 20th. Then along came August to continue the heat wave with 5 days from August 11th - 15th, when we sweltered at over 30 degrees.

The coldest days were in December from the 7th to the 18th, recording a frost every night, the lowest temperature dipped to a minus 7C on the 15th and 16th December. I gather in some places minus 10C was measured.

The wettest day being October 20th with 41.6mm of rain. The wettest month was November, with 229mm of rain recorded, which in the King's English is 9 inches of rain.

I conclude this report with rainfall totals in inches for the past 2 decades:

Two decades of records show the Parish rainfall annual average 35.63 inches.


<u>Up date</u> since writing the above, the weather has deteriorated and it is now concerning some unfortunate Parishioners, who are facing flooding. From 1st September 2022 to 15th January 2023 we have endured 23 inches of rain, including 6 inches of rain since 1st January. It has been an exceptionally wet period since 19th December on top of a very wet autumn and we are still only halfway through January.

Nature Notes

We don't seem to be able to get through a day without it raining. What a change from when I last wrote, when we were having a very cold snap. Nature has to be so adaptable to survive. The river is very high and flowing so fast. I noticed yesterday the swans had given up trying to navigate it and were sitting high up on the bank. Not so long ago when walking round the village I would usually see at least one little egret fishing, plus or minus a heron and sometimes catch sight of a kingfisher. All these birds have had to go elsewhere to hunt. The heron and little egret can find food in the fields and the kingfisher will go to more tranquil water, such as our pond though I have not spotted one fishing there for a while. The pond is also much deeper at the moment and with the fish tending to keep lower down at this time of the year, the kingfisher might find them a bit difficult to catch. We have had a pair of moorhens visiting regularly; they will find the river difficult to navigate and opt for an easier environment.

There have been strong winds which have certainly reduced the number of birds coming into the garden. Our garden is quite open especially to the westerly winds we have been having, on calmer days they come back, meanwhile they must shelter in the wood and hedgerows where it is warmer. It is not just the



always warmer under there so there will be more insect life, the rotting apples increase the temperature and harbour grubs as well as being food themselves. We still see the fieldfare defending the apples but not so vigorously. We have yet to have more fieldfares and redwings in the garden, I think this coming week we are due colder weather again so perhaps they will visit then. Actually, I have not seen many fieldfares or redwings, just fairly small flocks of a dozen or so.

Looking around the garden the bulbs are coming up, I know there are snow-drops already out in the churchyard at Longbridge. Several shrubs are now blooming which have a gorgeous scent; lonicera fragrantissima and mahonia japonica. A pulmonaria is in bloom and there are flowers on the cyclamen corm; a deep crimson red which stands out brightly in any weather conditions. I wanted to clear the rockery today to see the bulbs as they come through but it is too slippery so I decided to let it dry for a day or two. The reeds and irises in the pond should also be cut back before the toads become active again and the bird boxes need to be cleared out ready for the forthcoming breeding season. It doesn't seem that long ago that we did all it last year!
