

Dear Friends,

As I sit writing this, I am 'basking' in the sunshine. The ice and frosts of January and early February have gone and today we are in double figures on the thermometer. Spring has sprung, the churchyard in Kingston Deverill is awash with snowdrops. In my garden, I have seen more snowdrops, the first crocuses, primroses and daffodils, a real boost in these gloomy, dark and short days; and as we reflect on world events in Ukraine, Turkey and Syria and those suffering, we also feel their consequences in our lives.



By the time this is published Lent will have started, we will have eaten our pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, the Carnivals will have been celebrated across America and Europe and we will have been Ashed on Ash Wednesday. Then we will be looking forward to Easter in early April. Lent and Easter are two of the most significant events in the Christian calendar, a time when we reflect on Christ's journey, his message and ministry of salvation, the route to his trial, crucifixion, death and glorious resurrection.

The season of Lent lasts for forty days (not including Sundays). It is a time when Christians reflect and prepare for the celebrations of Easter. Some people fast, eat frugally or give up treats following the example of Jesus, who fasted for forty days in the wilderness.

People also give to charity, set aside time to study the Bible and meet with other Christians to reflect on Jesus' life and prepare for the events of Holy Week and Easter. There will be three Lent Lunches in the Deverills on **Tuesdays 21st March, 28th March and 4th April** (see page 4 for details).

As it says in Ecclesiastes – there is a time and season for every purpose under heaven. We have time in Lent to reflect and prepare, then celebrate with joy the central tenent of the Christian faith, the Resurrection of Jesus who died to save the world.



Nature Notes

The weather has been absolutely gorgeous recently; warm sunshine and hardly any breeze. Yesterday when I was tidying the pond I heard and saw honey bees on the early mauve crocuses. Bumble bees have been active for a while being more hirsute and



able to withstand colder weather. I found a small tortoiseshell butterfly on the window in the garage recently, I caught it and let it out; hopefully it will survive. It had been hibernating over winter and the sudden warm temperature had woken it, possibly too early. I knew there were lots of early flowering plants outside for it to feed on.

I have managed to tidy the reeds and irises in the pond, it looks a bit better. It needed sorting out before the amphibian invasion which will happen very soon, especially now the weather has changed and it's raining. I did spot one toad when working in the water, a big one so a female, and I think I heard one too. There is a lot of rotting vegetation still to be removed, reeds and irises that have been blown down into the water during the autumn and winter. What I have done so far hasn't upset the moorhens as I saw a pair there this morning.

The redwings and fieldfares eventually came for the apples; in fact, we had more feeding this year than we have had for a time. They came to feed in the morning when we were still having very cold nights. First of all, on 21st January it was just redwings, seven or so. The following day there were at least twenty redwings joined by three fieldfares. The next day there were more fieldfares so about equal numbers. The next couple of days the ground was just covered with fieldfares and redwings and the odd blackbird; there must have been over a hundred birds there feeding. They cleared the apples. On 26th January it was warmer, no overnight frost, and the feeding flock had reduced greatly. By the time the Garden Birdwatch started, on Friday 27th, there were no fieldfares or redwings in the garden. In fact, the garden was very quiet for the whole time of the Birdwatch. I was suspicious there was a predator about and on the Sunday I caught sight of the offender, a sparrowhawk. It had been hunting in the garden quite a bit lately, when I was out doing the pond earlier in the week I was alerted to its presence by all the tits making alarm calls. I watched it several times coming over the garden fence, swooping down to the feeders and flying up over the house roof to the right of the chimney, a tried and tested flight path. Luckily it didn't catch anything and finally flew away being harassed by a corvid.



We have checked the bird boxes and cleaned them out ready for this season. Out of nine boxes three were used. One hole box was used by blue tits and another by great tits. An open fronted box on the side of the house was used for the first time and I am pretty sure it was a robin though it kept it a secret!

TWAM is a UK charity based in Ipswich, Suffolk, with centres across the country. We have a mission to empower people in Africa living in extreme poverty to create their own livelihoods. We do this by sending trade kits full of tools that are used in skills training centres, offering the trainees a way to put poverty in the past for good and begin their own sustainable careers. We send around 18 containers to rural African communities every year, full of tools that have been collected from across the UK, and refurbished in our refurbishment centres. We have a strong environmental focus, as our work helps to keep around 225 tonnes of tools out of landfills in the UK every year. We also have a wide range of volunteering opportunities that enrich local UK communities and provide a safe environment for people to make friendships whilst making a difference.

The impact in the UK We offer a wide variety of volunteering opportunities to people in the UK. Many of them are lonely or vulnerable, and volunteering with TWAM gives them a sense of purpose as well as a community where they can feel cared for and needed. We have a team of over 400 volunteers who drive our vans, collect tools from the public, refurbish them in our refurbishment centre, and help us out in the office, amongst other roles. In short, we couldn't do anything without them!

The impact in Africa The tools we send go to community groups who train



the members of their community to use them. Many trainees are given tool kits upon graduation, allowing them to become self-sufficient from the moment they finish the course. Many trainees are very vulnerable, they may be in abusive relationships or forced to stay at home whilst their husband works all day. These groups give them a space to chat and laugh with friends while learning valuable skills.

The impact on Earth We play our part in combatting climate change by promoting reuse. We send around 225 tonnes of tools to Africa every year and recycle a further 180 tonnes of tools that are broken or unsuitable to send. Most of these tools are unwanted and are just sitting in someone's shed or garage waiting to go to the tip. Our work keeps all of these tools out of landfills and puts them in the hands of people who need them. Preserving their original use is even more environmentally friendly than recycling them.

Letter from Bishop Stephen

On Saturday 25th March, there are 274 shopping days left until Christmas! This timely reminder comes not to send you to the shops, but to remember there are nine months until Christmas comes again. For this day is the Feast of the Annunciation to the Blessed Virgin Mary, when Mary was told by the Archangel Gabriel she was to bear a son who she will name Jesus. This day reminds us of God's preparations behind the scenes for our salvation. Each year we celebrate the Incarnation, God being born among us, the Word made flesh, Emmanuel. Having an incarnational understanding, as Christians, means we understand God to be involved in our lives through the Holy Spirit, not just in March or at Christmas, but every day. God is preparing the deepening of his engagement with the human condition everyday as we further the work of his Kingdom. To live the next nine months knowing within ourselves God is preparing us for his mission is a helpful way of life, he is already at work, whether we choose him or not.
