Dear Friends,



I have just returned from a 2 week trip to Brooklyn New York to see our youngest daughter, her partner and our 3 year old grandson Yago. As you may imagine, it was very different to Longbridge Deverill! I had a wonderful time and it was so lovely to spend time with Yago playing cars and reading books amongst other things. You might be thinking Yago is a peculiar name for a little boy, actually, we all call him Yagi, his father is Spanish which kind of explains things. I have never really been enamoured with my name, in my teens I managed to change it to Polly, which I much prefer, however when I met Ian he said he felt like he was talking to a parrot so that was it. In hindsight I should have just stuck to my guns, but I was not very assertive back then. Names are really important and it's interesting to see the waxing and waning of the most popular names. Knowing someone's name immediately alters the nature of our relationship with them, our perception of them is changed; they are no longer a faceless homogenous *other*, they are living breathing human beings just like us.

When the baby church was coming into being in the century after Jesus's death and resurrection they had to work out what it meant to be a follower of Christ, or The Way, as they called it. St Paul wrote some great letters to a number of those churches encouraging them and helping them, because just like our church today, we get it wrong sometimes, well we do get it wrong much of the time to be honest, because we are human and humans lives are messy. Some of Paul's writing can be a bit convoluted, but now and again he comes out with a real gem. In his letter to the Galatians he writes: *'There is no longer Jew nor Greek, no longer slave nor free, there is no longer male nor female, for we are all one in Christ Jesus.'* We are, every one of us, a child of God, this it what it means to be human. And it gets even better; God knows each and everyone of us human beings by name. In the book of the prophet Isaiah we read:

But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour.

The above passage does not promise nothing bad will ever happen to us, and we have seen some terrible acts of violence these last weeks, but it does promise nothing can take away this incredibly intimate relationship we have with God. How extraordinary that God who created the cosmos knows you and me, by name. In our messy, heartbreaking world, in our joys and in our sorrows, whoever we are, whatever we have done, we are known and loved by that divine being who gives us life and in whose arms we die when our lives are done.

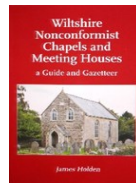

Bishop Karen's letter

I write this at the end of no mow May, and during a week when we are remembering to care for God's acre, so I am thinking about all those who serve in many ways tending our churchyards and enabling them to be places where God's creation and God's presence can be experienced. Thank you. As Patron of the Dorset wildlife trust's living churchyard project, I recently toured a local churchyard which has been transformed into an oasis, with wild flowers, bench seating and even some bee hives, tended by a local bee keeper, in the corner. In another part of Dorset, I recently dedicated a village meadow, where there are plans to offer bees, birds and visitors a welcome amongst carefully planted shrubs, trees and flowers. I look forward seeing it in future years.



Community orchards and gardens are also transforming lives as produce grown is shared out and given away. The abundance of creation's riches on our doorstep is for all to enjoy. 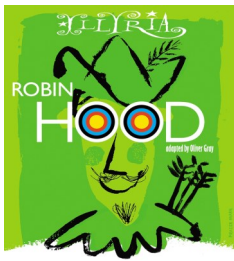

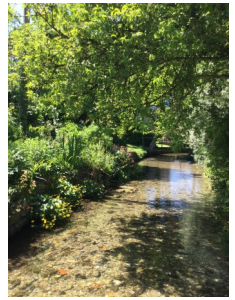

River banks

Alex Deacon, from the Wessex Rivers Trust, has given us some advice on how, by making some changes to the way we manage our garden river banks, we can help our wildlife flourish. The ideal river environment is a mosaic of light and shade, weed and open channels, and plant-rich river banks. About half the river surface should be shaded by trees and shrubs. Shady reaches provide a cool refuge for fish that cannot tolerate high temperatures. Leaving other areas open to direct sunlight encourages the growth of water-crowfoot and watercress, where the baby fish, insects and invertebrates live. Garden riverbanks should be rich with vegetation (weeds!) both in and out of the water. A neat lawn mowed right to the river's edge and a boarded river bank may look neat and tidy, but they give almost nothing to the life of the river and its inhabitants. If you have to cut back any weed then try to create a chequerboard pattern, removing 40% or less. This will minimize disruption to wildlife. If you pile weed on the bank after cutting, and wash it down with clean water, this will return as many creatures as possible to the river to continue their lives. Churchyard project



We are fortunate to have several ancient churchyards in our valley and one of them, St Mary the Virgin in Kingston Deverill, is the focus of some work by members of the Upper Deverills Wildlife and Conservation Group to improve it as a home for wildlife without disturbing its timeless beauty and tranquillity. We have been very careful not to spoil the charm of the churchyard, which is already beautifully maintained with neatly mown grass and a superb display of snowdrops in the early spring. Our work to enrich the habitat has therefore been focused on two areas out of sight of the main churchyard: behind the church (on the north side) and in the churchyard extension.

If you take a look behind the church you will see some newly planted native shrubs and plants including Wayfaring Tree, Guelder Rose, Sweet-Briar, Alder Buckthorn, Spindle Tree, Sweet Cherry, Dog-rose, Comfrey, Campion and Foxglove, a wood pile for hedgehogs and a pile of stones for reptiles. In the churchyard extension you will be able to see a rectangular area of grass being carefully managed, by cutting, clearing and sowing seed, to restore the richness and diversity of plants that grew there in centuries past. This is a long term project but you can already see interesting varieties of wild flowers and grasses.

Nature Notes

The moorhen chicks emerged last Sunday and are doing very well. There are 6 in total and already there is a difference in size between the most precocious and the runt. The parents are very attentive and protective chasing away anything landing too near the pond. A squirrel appeared and it was soon chased off by an angry moorhen. I expect it had come into the garden looking for cherries, but there none this year, probably due to a combination of the hard frosts, the heat and arid conditions. When a cat appears both parents start making very loud clucking sounds and put themselves between their chicks and the predator. The chicks know the warning sound and go into hiding. It will be a difficult time ahead for the moorhen family with all the predators about especially if the cats (and there are at least 6 active hunters around here) start working like a pride of lions!



When I wrote last month, I reported the swallow nest had been refurbished with a good layer of mud added to the top of the cup. I can now tell you there are 5 well grown chicks in the nest about to branch out into the stable rafters. I felt for them during the heatwave, they were all hanging over the edge of the nest with their beaks wide open gasping in the heat. I spotted the parents swooping down over the pond and collecting water to take to them; quite a feat to get the angle of the dive just right to collect water but not end up in it! Water-logging could be fatal. Also last month I told you house martins had just arrived. I am pleased to say both compartments of the artificial dual nest box at the front of the house are now in use. Our neighbour across the road has a natural nest which already has chicks. I am waiting to hear cheeping from ours. There are good numbers of swifts about this year, I have seen a few over the village but the most I have seen is at Fore Street in town. The traffic lights there have enabled me to watch the skies in safety and recently while waiting in the queue the sky was full of them; lovely to see.

The pond has been busy with dragonflies and damselflies with the heat. There are two types of dragonflies; broad bodied chaser and southern hawker. The damselflies are mostly blue, there are several species of that colour! I have also seen a beautiful demoiselle, in the garden, which are large damselflies.

We heard the cuckoo back on the 24th May, it was a still evening and it called several times, I didn't hear it again. On the 6th June, coming back from getting the paper from the shop late evening, I saw an otter from the wooden footbridge! I watched it for a good 5 minutes flushing out fish from the weed along the bank and coming to the surface to eat. It was the first time I had seen a wild otter; I will never forget it.



I am still feeding hedgehogs and see them most evenings. Water is very important for all the wildlife; just a shallow dish will do.
