

Welcome to 2024, as we enter the season of Epiphany Happy New Year to everyone. 12th Night, on the 5th January, is the Eve of Epiphany. Epiphany also known as the Three Kings' Day, it's when we celebrate how the star led the Magi - also known as the Three kings or the Wise Men - to visit the baby Jesus after he had been born in the stable at Bethlehem. T S Elliot wrote a poem "The Journey of the Magi": 'A cold coming we had of it, just the worst time of year, for a journey, and such a long journey: The ways deep and weather sharp, the very dead of winter.'

We are now on a long journey, as our Parish is in vacancy, an interregnum, we are without a Rector. However, the process to find a new one has begun, it usually takes around a year. The PCC are preparing a Profile, a prospectus about the parish, our churches, communities, local amenities and the role of our priest. The Profile, with a Job Description, will form the advert for the post. The Bishop and Archdeacon will short list the applicants and interview them with a team from the Parish. We aim to have the post advertised after Easter, with interviews held before the Summer.

Until a new Priest is appointed, we continue the routine pattern of worship with lay led services and the help of a number of visiting priests. The church continues to provide services, baptisms, weddings and funerals.

We all have journeys ahead in the New Year, together or individually, I hope they will be a blessing to you and through them you may bring blessings to others.

The Friends of the Deverills Churches

The Deverill Valley has three beautiful churches which hold a unique place in the early history of England and have been a focal point for our villages for over 1000 years. Throughout each year our churches are in regular use for services, weddings, baptisms and funerals, as well as concerts, meetings, talks and exhibitions. The Parochial Church Council raises funds to maintain the buildings from church collections, social events and, where possible, grants from specific charities, but it is never quite enough. The Friends of the Deverills Churches was formed in 2014 (Charity Commission 1170564) to appeal to the wider community with funds raised used solely for the upkeep of the church buildings, fixtures and fittings. Since then it has made a real difference raising over £38,000. The Trustees thank Sir Roger Wheeler, who retired from the trust last year, for chairing it since its formation. 


December - for Christmas there are three winners Elizabeth Stewart £75, Claire Watts £50 & Sean Dufosee £25

Are you prepared for flooding?

As seen on numerous occasions on the news and weather forecasts many more places in the UK are at risk of flooding, even in areas of low risk, this is usually due to flooding from groundwater when the ground is saturated,



water tables around the country are rising as well as rising river levels.

Please ensure drains and ditches that are your responsibility are kept clear. It is the homeowner's responsibility to protect their home from flooding. Where possible, the council, emergency services and Environment Agency will help, however if flooding is over a large area, they may not be able to respond. Be vigilant to the condition of drains and storm drains not necessarily your responsibility, but if you are able to clear these drains safely when they are clogged with mud and debris please do so, this may reduce the likelihood of homes from flooding.

Points to consider in case your home is flooded

Store important documents and items safely in waterproof containers at the highest point of your property; make sure all electrical appliances, mains gas, electricity and water are turned off; plug sinks, baths and showers and weigh the plug down to prevent back flow; if possible move as much furniture as you can upstairs or raise off the floor; check your property insurance; make an emergency flood kit including blankets, warm/waterproof clothing, bottled water, food, torches, a first aid kit and ensure your mobile phone is fully charged.

Do you know your flood risk?

Check if you are at risk of flooding from main rivers, groundwater and surface water; sign up to receive free flood warnings for main rivers and groundwater; sign up to the MetOffice National severe Weather Warning Service via web or app. Call the floodline on 0345 988 1188 or visit www.gov.uk/flood and www.gov.uk/check-flooding. Stay safe and do not put yoursself at risk.

Upper Deverills Wildlife & Conservation Group - open to all!



Two years ago some of us set up this Group, without any formal membership, to share our enjoyment of nature and do what we can to help conserve our plants, animals and their habitats.

This year, we have continued our work on two long-term projects. Our farmland bird survey spans April to June, counting species like yellow hammers, skylarks, and corn buntings across twelve locations. These findings contribute to the British Trust for Ornithology's conservation work. We were really delighted to see wild orchids flourishing on our downland during this year's June surveys.

A second project is gradually to improve Kingston churchyard as a haven for wildlife while preserving its beauty and sacred character. We are working to create a flower-rich meadow, and to establish wildflowers, bushes, and habitats for insects and reptiles around the edge of the churchyard. One summer's day some of us were fortunate to spot a Long-eared Owl, unusual in Wiltshire, resting on the fence along the lane by the churchyard.

Recently, we have embarked on a new project to study our chalk stream, the Deverill or Wylye. Weekly sampling at four locations involves testing temperature and phosphate concentration, aiding the Wessex Rivers Trust in assessing the river's health in our catchment. We will extend this work next year to sampling and counting a rich variety of invertebrates living in the river.

Our year also included fascinating walks led by David Scales on Lower Pertwood and Richard Stratton on Manor Farm, Kingston Deverill. These walks and interesting evening talks are open to all, and we will do more in 2024.

Our group operates without formalities - it is about the shared passion for nature. We extend an open invitation to all interested in nature, whatever your level of knowledge. The New Year might hold opportunities for us to explore and discover nature together. Will you consider joining us in 2024? Nature Notes

Maybe it was just me, but I felt there was a touch of spring in the air today, it was lovely to see the sun again. I noticed more birds about, we had lots of blue and great tits on the feeders and goldfinches; there were more blackbirds on the lawn too. The blackbirds have started eating the pyracantha berries at the front of the house. Whilst washing-up, there were two blue tits outside the window

and one seemed to be looking right in at me. A few minutes later I spotted two blue tits, perhaps the same two, on the beech tree together with a great tit near the nest box. I don't think they had ideas of nesting but it made me remember the boxes need cleaning out. Two other things made me feel spring was on the horizon, hearing a blackbird sing and a great spotted woodpecker drumming, it drummed several times so I definitely didn't imagine it!



There are more fieldfares and redwings around, every time I go out into the garden, I can hear them; the cha-cha-chack of the fieldfare and the high pitched penetrating steep call of the redwing. They seem to like landing in the two big cherry trees. I spotted a fieldfare amongst the fallen apples today, I expect it will be joined by more especially if the weather turns colder. The apples are also being enjoyed by some cock pheasants; usually five but we have had up to eight in the garden. Our neighbour's young cat has designs on them, it lurks in the undergrowth near the feeders where the pheasants clear up the dropped food. He tries his luck by shooting out at them which causes a loud shriek from the poor startled pheasant. Thankfully so far, he's not been successful.



With the river being so high, chalky and fast flowing after all the rain we have had, the kingfishers have come to the pond to fish. I continue to be surprised there have been no herons or egrets coming as I have seen them flying over. At the end of November, when the river was at a normal level, I am sure I saw a great egret; a bird the size of a heron but pure white. I saw it from the bridge in Sand Street looking south, but have not seen it since.

I am still feeding hedgehogs; each evening putting out a bowl of food at the front and back which is all gone by the morning. I know it's hedgehogs as they usually leave their calling card, solids and liquids, not long ago I didn't know what hedgehog poo looked like! Now I rarely see a hedgehog, not like the summer when I would quite often nearly step on one. I do hear them some evenings when they are crunching through the bowl of food I have just put out. The feeding stations are wooden boxes you can't see through.

This morning I received a flyer from the RSPB reminding me about the **Big Garden Birdwatch on 26th to 28th January**. Let's hope the weather will be settled; not windy or pouring with rain. Happy New Year to you all.
