

## **Letter from Bishop Stephen**

It won't have escaped many of us that this year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day. This may feel like an uncomfortable union. Whilst we know Valentine's Day is Saint Valentine's Day, the commercial reality of this occasion means it has become a day of heart-




shaped balloons and chocolates, red roses and looking your best for a romantic meal for two. This doesn't sit easily with the sombre, penitential tone of Ash Wednesday when flowers are removed from our churches, and we are brought face to face with our imperfections; our daily ability to turn from God. As a gritty cross of ash is marked on our forehead we are told. Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

This stark, deeply humbling, yet powerful moment sets the tone for the season of Lent when we are called to step into the wilderness with Christ and into a time of prayer, self-reflection, repentance and self-denial. Yet, nothing about Ash Wednesday or Lent is about dwelling in self-loathing or indeed an unforgiveness of ourselves for the times when we have turned from God. On the contrary, it is a time when we are re-directed and re-centred on our absolute need for God – for God's forgiveness, for God's grace, for God's saving love made known to us through Jesus.

Maybe then Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday are not poles apart after all. For it is in the wilderness of Lent, and in the events of Holy Week that follow, we see face to face the depths of God's love. A love that is not expressed in fine dining or red roses, but the bread and wine of the Last Supper, the blood of Christ shed on the cross and the joy of the open tomb on Easter morning.



## **Open Door Warminster**

This is an unincorporated association regulated by the Charity Commission. We are a volunteer group supporting residents of Warminster and surrounding villages. We were set up in 2020 determined to create opportunities for people who were feeling isolated or excluded from society, for whatever reason, to come together in a safe and encouraging environment and talk about how they feel and how they would like to feel. We run four drop-in groups:

The Thursday **Friendship Chat Café** opens its doors every Thursday morning for anyone who is feeling lonely or isolated. It's a lively welcoming environment where everyone relaxes and enjoys a good chat over a cuppa and some cake! The Chat Café occasionally welcomes Ashley from Victim Support, she is happy to discuss issues privately, so if you require her assistance, please let us know.

And we do it all over again each Monday evening from 7.00 pm with the **Du Soir** gathering! If you have priorities during the day that prevent you from benefiting from our other groups, then this is the one for you!

On the first and third Friday of the month is the **Cancer Support Café** for anyone personally affected by cancer or supporting a loved one through it. Our volunteers all have lived experience of cancer and are happy to help you talk through yours. At the Cancer Support Café on 2nd February, we will welcome Liina, a Nurse Facilitator for Personalised Care for cancer patients. On 15th March Karen, a Macmillan Welfare Advisor, will be available to help guests directly affected by cancer with issues relating to grants or benefits.

On the 2nd and 4th Friday of each month we hold the **Grief Support Café**. Grief is something everyone will experience. Our volunteer chatters will help you work through the feelings grief brings to the surface - while they can't take away the pain, they will try to help you live through it.

The morning Chat Cafés run from 10:00 am - 12:00.noon. The evening group opens at 7.00 pm and is buzzing until 8:30 pm! All are held at The Athenaeum Centre, 18 - 20 High Street, Warminster, BA12 9AE. Each group is a drop-in when you want, there is no charge for refreshments or company!

**Volunteers** – we would appreciate extra helpers willing to chat and sit with our visitors. Please call us for an informal chat or visit a Café to find out for yourself what we do while enjoying a cup of tea or coffee.

## **HGV** vehicles on village roads

The Upper Deverills Parish Council has been working with other local Parishes, Local Wiltshire Councillors and Andrew Murrison MP to address the problem of HGV vehicles on village roads. This links to the Upper Deverills Parish Plan 2022. In the Parish Plan, HGV traffic reduction and improved road safety on



the B3095 were considered by the respondents to the 2022 questionnaire to be the highest priority in each of our three villages. A Traffic Regulation Order was passed in 2009 that would have imposed a 7.5 ton weight limit on the B3095 but for various reasons the Order has never been implemented.

On 15th December 2023 Upper Deverills Parish Council attended a meeting with Cllr Caroline Thomas, cabinet member for Highways at Wiltshire Council, Dr Andrew Murrison MP, and Cllr Bill Parks from Wiltshire Council as well as representatives from Maiden Bradley, Corsley and Corsham. Cllr Thomas provided an update on work done so far by Wiltshire Council to implement the weight limit. She also set out the procedure the Council will take in 2024 in order to seek to implement the weight limit. This will include data gathering, data modelling, wide public consultation and a vote by Wiltshire Council Cabinet. The meeting was mentioned in the Warminster Journal and on Warminster Community Radio. Those at the meeting felt there appeared to be a political will to find a solution.

It should be noted that during the consultation period there will be an opportunity for residents to express their views. It should also be noted that if the Order is implemented, then any restriction will still allow access for vehicles over the weight limit.

## Glass making - New Year, New Hobby ...?

Glass Fusing is the process of joining glass together in a specialist kiln. Anyone can create unique and stunning works of glass art with just a small amount of instruction. Champagne Glass Studio offers workshops to total beginners.



Until July 2023, Caroline Robinson was running the music department in a school. However, her hobby has become full time and she is passionate about sharing the love of this lesser-known craft form with others. As well as creating beautiful pieces herself, Caroline runs a very popular range of workshops from her home in Warminster. In a half day workshop, you will learn how the creative process works and make two fused-glass pieces of your own. To start, you will create a hanging sun-catcher using a huge range of coloured glasses. Then after a break for cake and hot drinks, you will create a small draped dish. There are many pieces to copy if you don't feel confident to design something yourself. After about a week your work will be fired and ready to collect.

## **Rainfall Report for 2023**

It is no surprise to anyone when I say the year 2023 has been an extremely wet and, in fact, a record breaking rainy year for this Parish. The details provided by a number of dedicated Rainfall Observers reveal the alarming figure of 51.46 inches of rain recorded. Therefore, more than 15 inches in 2023 above the average for this Parish of the Deverills, and Crockerton.

However, we did enjoy a long spell of rain-free days through May and June with lovely sunny days and high temperatures, there were 40 consecutive days with temperatures over 20C peaking at 28C in the middle of June.

January 2023 was the wettest month with 175 MM/6.88 inches recorded. February, the driest Month 15.3 MM/0.602 inches recorded. The coldest period stretched from January 17th to 25th with a frost every night. The rain really started during the Autumn. I measured during the 4 months from September to December 530 MM or 21 inches of rain soaked down.

I conclude this report with the rainfall totals for the past two decades:

The average annual rainfall during the 20+ years above taken from various sites is 36.23 Inches.

The recent storm Henk brought heavy rain, gales and misery and flooding during the first few days of January 2024; on Thursday 4th very sadly various domestic premises were flooded. As I write this we have started the New Year with nearly 3 inches of rain recorded before the end of the first week.

#### **Nature Notes**

The hedgehogs have finally hibernated. They were taking food every night until 5th January but the food hasn't been touched overnight since then. I am still putting a little food out for them because I am told they can wake up during hibernation and want



something to eat and I would hate to think they went to their regular café to find it was closed! Apparently, there are now reports of hedgehogs not hibernating at all in the warmer southern counties. This colder spell of weather has obviously triggered the ones here to go to sleep; now the question comes when will they wake up. That will be influenced by the weather and also when they run low on body reserves. It's so cold now, I look at the houses where I think they are snuggled up asleep and wonder how they cope with such low temperatures; if we tried it we would definitely get hypothermia. I wonder if the hedgehogs that don't hibernate and have their normal sleep will be affected in their breeding capability and possibly their lifespan.

The pond is frozen so we don't get the kingfishers now. Before the freeze we had a heron visit and a pair of moorhens. I saw the great egret again quite close on the river bank near the wooden footbridge on the main road. It made me realise just how big it was, being so white it emphasises its size.



The cold has brought a lot more birds to the feeders and with more birds there is more guano so keeping the feeders clean is quite a job. Lots of tits come, blue, great and long-tailed with occasionally a coal. I counted 6 blue tits earlier today and the fat slab was covered in long-tailed making it difficult to count them, not so many great tits, but perhaps they are just elsewhere. Finding enough food and keeping warm is vital in these conditions. Birds will flock together so there are more eyes to spot food and also watch out for predators. They also

roost together for warmth. I have watched wrens going into house martin boxes to roost; I read somewhere over 50 had been counted roosting together in a box. Pied wagtails will go into towns and cities where it's warmer and I can recall a photograph in a magazine with loads of them roosting in amongst the Christmas lights on some silver birch trees in a shopping mall.

The great spotted woodpecker has been drumming again on the transformer pole next to us; it's in the same place as last year where it gets the maximum resonance. The male and female have been coming over to the fat slab. Lately I heard tawny owls at dusk when sorting out the feeders. Owls don't like wet weather so it was good to hear them since its been dry. Our weather does swing from one extreme to the other these days.

There are signs of spring with bulbs coming up, snowdrops and daffodils; the birds are beginning to sing more in the morning and the days are getting longer.
