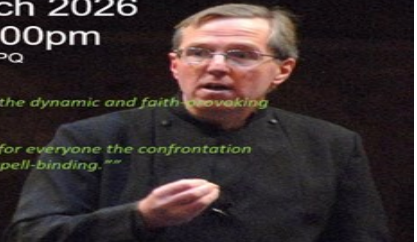

“Lord, it is good for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three dwellings here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah” (Matthew 17: 4)



John Hackett, seventeenth century Bishop of Lichfield, preached that offering to build dwellings for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah was “...*the greatest error that St Peter committed*”. Hackett’s verdict has always struck me as somewhat harsh. True, Peter does not respond to a scene of unearthly glory with a paean of awestruck wonder. But then Peter was a fisherman. He was good with his hands. He was used to mending boats, gutting fish, and patching up nets. Brought face to face with the light of Heaven he reverts to type. What can he *do*? Make some ‘dwellings’ – obviously!

It is a relief to me we read a Gospel account of the Transfiguration before Lent, and catch a glimpse of the divine before we descend to the wilderness and begin the weeks of penitence and fasting. It is a relief to me because St Peter manifestly fails to rise to the occasion. He does not do what the circumstances seem to demand. He does not utter beautiful words we still sing as a canticle in our worship. He does not leave the mountain-top with a serene countenance and a steadfast heart, forever a changed man. No. He reverts to type. He offers to get his chisel and plane out and knock something together.

And this is a relief because the weeks of Lent compel me to acknowledge, like St Peter, I very rarely rise to the occasion. I make vows about abstinence and study, only to break them. I receive ash on my forehead and daub it on the foreheads of others, only to find myself thinking about my supper. I hear the gorgeous music of the Cathedral choir and walk in solemn procession behind them, only to obsess about impossible neighbours, unwritten sermons, and difficult colleagues. In short, I revert to type – gluttonous, distracted, and cross.

But perhaps the expectation that I might rise to God’s occasion or live up to God’s moment is just one more example of human vanity, one more instance in which I am convinced it’s all about me. It’s not. Lent, however imperfectly observed, leads to Passiontide, when God in Jesus does not rise to the occasion. He descends to it. To the scourge, to the nails, to the crown of thorns. He comes down the mountain and joins us. And that’s why there is hope.

Meanwhile the PCC have addressed some outstanding safety and environmental work in St Mary's, Kingston Deverill Church updating the electrical system. Also replacing the ramp.

Special thanks go to Alan Rymell who constructed and installed a new wheelchair access ramp at the entrance.

The 5 yearly electrical inspection identified safety issues which needed rectification. The overhead heaters have been replaced with a modern efficient system and the old light fittings replaced by LED lighting.

All this work is financed by the PCC, there is no Diocesan funding. The PCC are very grateful for the support, work and contributions making this necessary work possible. Without the continued financial and practical support of the Friends of the Deverill Churches, people in the Parish and the congregation the fabric of the church would not survive.

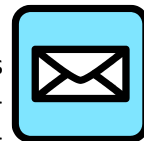

Bill Hurd

Bill was born at Mill Farmhouse, Hill Deverill on 13th December 1931; he had a brother, John, and a sister, Barbara. They grew up on the farm learning to milk by hand before going to school at Longbridge Deverill (now the Village Hall). He went on to Avenue School in Warminster before at 16 spending a year at Cannington Agriculture College. He married Monica on 30th July 1955. They had five children - Susan, Karen, Paul, Tim and Toby. Sadly, Toby died in a scooter accident in 1986 aged 18, but from tragedy came a group called Compassionate Friends for people who had lost children. Bill and Monica hosted the meetings at Mill Farm. Bill enjoyed sport, especially cricket and football; he ran the Young Farmers Club, joined other farming associations and the Young Conservatives. Bill served as a Conservative Councillor, and was Chair of Longbridge Deverill Parish Council for approximately 15 years. Bill gave up farming in the mid 1990s remaining at Mill Farmhouse, sadly Monica died of cancer in 1998. In June 2003 Bill met Gill, for which he felt very fortunate, and they married in October 2004 buying a cottage in Sand Street, Longbridge Deverill. Gill introduced him to cruises, holidays and coach trips. In 2012, when Bill's health deteriorated they moved to Thornhill Road, Warminster and later to Crescent Place, Portway, where Bill died just one day before his 94th birthday. Bill had an infectious smile, a sense of fun and a twinkle in his eye, he was kind and thoughtful and had a great sense of community. His Christian faith was important to him, he often read the lesson at Longbridge services. He will be missed by family and friends alike.

Defibrillator Awareness Training



About 30,000 people each year suffer a sudden cardiac arrest so it is imperative bystanders know how to respond. A cardiac arrest can affect anyone at any time, young children at school, adults at home, work or in public places. Cardiac arrests are often fatal. The British Heart Foundation's figures show only one in ten victims survive. But the chance of surviving a cardiac arrest jumps from 6% to 74% if the casualty is in a shockable rhythm and a defibrillator is deployed within 3 minutes.

Although anyone can use a Defibrillator without training, as the instructions are verbally given when the box is opened, it can be a pretty scary experience and receiving some basic training can give confidence to go ahead. I am hoping to organize a Defibrillator Awareness session, run by South West Ambulance service, during this year. However, the last time this was organized only two people came so I am reluctant to do this without prior knowledge that there will have a reasonable turn out. SECURITY



The 20-Minute Walkaround Essential Security Check for Rural Properties

You don't need expensive gadgets or expert surveys to make your rural property more secure. In just twenty minutes, a careful walkaround can help you spot vulnerabilities and make immediate improvements. Most rural crime is opportunistic, intruders look for the simplest way in, such as unlocked gates, weak padlocks, or sheds with loose doors. By viewing your property like a stranger, you can identify what might attract a break-in.

Carry out your check as it gets dark, when it's easier to spot weak points. Begin from the edge of your property, as if arriving for the first time. From a typical parking spot, consider whether the front door is visible, or if someone could approach unseen. Hidden entrances, out of sight from the road or neighbouring properties, make it easier for intruders to go unnoticed. Inspect your gate, and ensure it can't be lifted off its hinges and is properly secured.

Walk the boundaries and identify every possible entry point, such as side passages and field gates. Police advise restricting access to a single, controlled entrance. Unlocked side gates are a common oversight, secure them, even if they are used only for bins.

Evaluate your lighting, do motion sensors illuminate key areas, or are critical paths, like the route to your back door, in darkness? Effective lighting is a powerful deterrent but only if it covers the right places.

Outbuildings are especially at risk because they are often poorly secured and rarely checked. Inspect all padlocks and fastenings, are they strong enough to resist basic tools? Remove items like ladders or crowbars stored outside, as these can be used to facilitate a break-in. Address any weaknesses immediately if your shed or outbuilding is a soft target.

Finally, check every ground-floor window and door of your main house. Ensure all locks are robust and that windows lock securely, even when slightly open. Keep car keys out of sight and away from doors or windows to prevent relay theft.

Jot down your observations on your phone and take action on the easiest fixes straight away. Repeat this simple check every six months to keep your property secure and your peace of mind intact.

NATURE NOTES

This February is definitely living up to the old saying “February fill dyke”. The ground is absolutely saturated; walking past a nearby field of wheat, the crop in the corner looked just like a paddy field of rice. Hopefully it will dry up soon otherwise the wheat plants will die. It would be good to get out in the garden to do some tidying up but the weather is so unhelpful. I have managed to clear out some of the horrible weed from the pond. It is like spaghetti, wrapped around itself and bits left behind, like bindweed, can become a new plant. But I have made an impression and the fish appreciate the clear water to swim in. The moorhens seem pleased too. We still have an adult pair; the young ones were pushed out. I did see the moorhens mating about a week ago but four nights later, in the early hours, I am pretty sure I heard “a kill”; moorhens alarm call and the sound of one being throttled. The following morning there was just one moorhen on the pond looking for its mate. Then two days later there were two, I am fairly confident the male had found himself a new partner. So far, the herons haven’t spotted the fish are easier to see with more clear water. It’s also better now for me to spot any amphibians; there have only been a handful so far as it’s not been warm enough, it’s certainly been wet enough!

I am suspicious a fox may have taken the moorhen. I was aware of a strong fox odour at the top of the garden about five days before the moorhen was killed. I saw a lovely big red fox, a dog I think, run across the field just outside the garden and disappear. The first time I have seen a fox for ages, it looked in good condition, its red coat glowing in the morning sunlight.



With all the rain the lawn looks lovely and green and the snowdrops stand out well. They look so delicate and fragile but they seem to cope with all the bad weather. The crocuses don’t fare so well, but the early mauve ones will close up their petals when it’s raining and look as if they are standing to attention like pencils so the water will run off of them. When the sun comes out, they open up and look stunning. We have got a mass of early crocuses, they look like an army marching down from the back of the rockery across the lawn and increase each year. The lawn has lots of worm casts; often at this time of the year the ground can be hard with frost. The other day a female green woodpecker was feeding on the lawn for ages, when I walked across the grass later I found big holes.

I cleaned the bird boxes out at the end of January and of the nine boxes, four were used; three by tits and one by house sparrow. My count for the Big Garden Birdwatch was less than usual mainly due to the awful weather.

The hedgehog continues to eat well and often deposits a pile of poo which is reassuring so I know it’s a hog that I am feeding.
