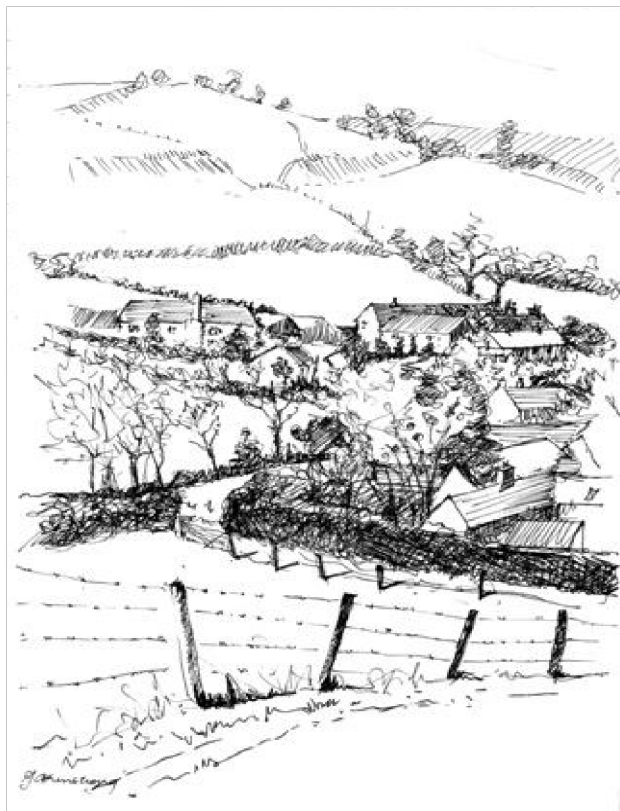

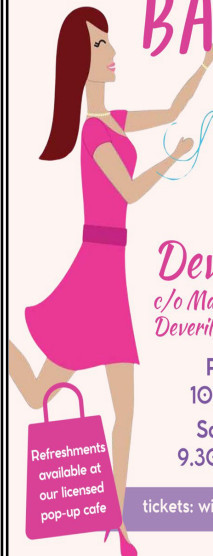

Speed Watch in the Deverills



Whilst drivers may have differing views, there are unfortunately many cars speeding through the villages. We are lucky to have dedicated teams of volunteers in the valley, taking the time to carry out Community Speed Watch in various locations, each month.

Wiltshire Police have also been running a Police Road Safety Campaign throughout the county and have recently supported our villages in carrying out some of their own speed enforcement. The following facts were gathered by the Wiltshire Police Traffic Enforcement team, from one village location, in June. 'On



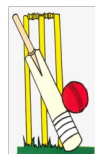
a stretch of road which clearly displays a speed limit of 30 mph, eight vehicles were recorded speeding, one as fast as 48 mph. Five of these drivers will be offered a speed awareness course and three will receive a fixed penalty notice and three points.'

For general information from Wiltshire Police: flashing lights at other drivers is illegal and has no effect on the long-term driving habits; drivers who are in the habit of speeding will continue to speed until they are caught. If you have friends or family who like to warn others of the speed enforcement ahead, but they do not like people speeding in the place where they live, please politely ask them to stop doing this and help us make our roads safer.

Anne Harrison



Anne Harrison (nee Mackintosh) died peacefully at her home on Sand Street, Longbridge Deverill, on 5th July aged 90. After growing up on a farm in Dorset Anne had a long career working for SOAS University (School of Oriental and African Studies) London as an administrator looking after lecturers. Late in life she married John Harrison who was a history professor with a special interest in India. They retired to Hereford from where they travelled and walked and Anne assisted her husband John in his continued research and writings.

After John's death Anne moved to Sand Street to be near her older brother and her nephews and wider family. She took regular walks around the village mapping the routes in her increasingly "muddled head" and always felt so warmly welcomed by all she met on her travels. She couldn't always remember who you were but I think she took comfort that at least you seemed to know who she was.

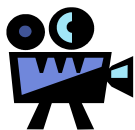

The Parish Plan

Thank you to everyone who responded to the Parish Plan, we are collating all responses then will start on updating our current plan.

Longleat Estate Update

The Parish Council have received the following update from Longleat Estate; *"I am writing to follow up on my letter in February regarding the latest investment in Longleat Estate, namely Shearwater and Heaven's Gate. The roads in both areas remain the responsibility of the Highways Authority, but we will be introducing car parking charges from £1.50 for an hour now the work is completed. This will support continued investment in the area. You will have seen the signs installed which went live on Monday 13th July and will operate using number plate recognition. We have appointed NPC to manage the car parks and it will be the enforcing authority. Following feedback, we have amended the plans to support horse riders with parking for horse boxes and are in touch directly with those who contacted us, and this will be implemented on 1st August. Blue Badge holders will not be charged if using the designated disabled bays. I am delighted to say that Shearwater Cabin is continuing to go from strength to strength and we have recently introduced a smaller refreshment operation at Heaven's Gate to support walkers and riders."* **Ragwort – action for landowners please**

The Government has listed ragwort as one of 5 weeds covered by the Weeds Act 1959; stating ragwort is harmful to equines and other animals. Please see **www.gov.uk/guidance/stop-ragwort-and-other-harmful-weeds-from-spreading**.

The responsibility for controlling the spread and growth of ragwort rests with the occupier of the land where it is growing. Government advises occupiers of all land, (including uncultivated land, derelict and waste areas) to be vigilant for the presence of ragwort. Action to prevent its spread should be taken when it poses a high risk on land used for grazing, or forage production. Livestock owners should be satisfied livestock is not exposed to ragwort poisoning. In order to prevent ragwort seed production, mowing is a short-term measure as plants persist and re-grow. Pulling is a more effective but only feasible for small infestations, re-growth can occur from detached roots left in the soil. The Government support strategic management as opposed to last-minute control, as the most effective way to manage the growth and spread of ragwort. Ragwort on verges please report to

Wiltshire & Bath Air Ambulance Charity reveal 2026 mission figures so far this year

We are here when you need us most, but in the nicest possible way, we hope you don't. We provide critical medical care by land and air across Wiltshire and Bath, delivering the same level of care as a hospital by bringing our expert team and specialist equipment directly to those in need as fast as humanly possible. We are on call 365 days a year, 19 hours a day. Our team responds to an average of three incidents daily, attending by helicopter or critical care car. This vital work is only possible thanks to the generosity of our

Wiltshire and Bath communities. As a registered Charity, we receive no regular government funding and rely entirely on the generous donations and support of our local communities. Based in central Wiltshire, our helicopter can reach anywhere in Wiltshire within eleven minutes and the centre of Bath in just four.

So far in 2026, we have attended 595 missions, including 18 missions in Warminster and the surrounding areas. February was our busiest ever, making it the first February in our history to respond to more than 100 missions. The proportion of missions attended by a critical care doctor has increased from 61% in 2025 to 65% so far this year. That means more patients can receive advanced procedures and lifesaving interventions at the scene, bringing hospital-level care directly to the patient.

Traditional Orchard Creation Opportunity

Cranborne Chase National Landscape aims to support the creation of ten new, community managed 'traditional orchards' across the National Landscape. These orchards will enhance local places and spaces for people, biodiversity, heritage, and landscape character. Orchards have long been regarded as special places, appearing throughout literature, folklore and proverb. The idea that "*sharing an apple brings friendship*" reflects their associations with hospitality, goodwill, luck and community connection. We are inviting **Town & Parish Councils, established community groups, and landowners** to express interest in restoring derelict orchards or creating new community 'traditional orchards'.



Traditional orchards are recognised as a **UK Biodiversity Action Plan Priority Habitat**, contributing significantly to biodiversity, landscape character and to local distinctiveness. They preserve rare and regionally important fruit cultivars, strengthening local genetic diversity and cultural heritage.

To maximise biodiversity a wide variety of trees, shrubs and plants may be suitable depending on the site, additional planting within boundary hedgerows or orchard edges would increase diversity and abundant resources for wildlife. Each orchard will be established and managed **by the local community**, with support from the National Landscape team and specialist orchard advisors. Suitable orchard sites should be close to residential areas, accessible to the public (formal, permissive or managed access), on land appropriate for low intensity, nature rich management. Management principles should include: minimal or no chemical inputs; long lived trees allowed to reach veteran stages; grazing or hay cutting; clear ambitions for biodiversity abundance; a written establishment and management plan; climate resilience.

Cranborne Chase National Landscape has received capital funding from Defra to support the Government's Environmental Improvement Plan target of creating 250,000ha of wildlife rich habitat by 2030.

Funding (confirmed for 2026/27 and indicative for two subsequent years) can support the actions required to develop and create traditional orchard habitat, including the purchase or long term lease of land, essential access and management infrastructure, ground preparation, tree stock, protection and planting. All capital actions must be completed within a single financial year.

Nature Notes

Driving into town yesterday I saw a red kite and at least three swifts on the top of Bell Hill, returning to the village another red kite greeted me but sadly no swifts. Not long ago we never saw red kites here. It was when we took a holiday in Wales in 1999 we first saw them. I remember looking out for them and being sure we were seeing a kite for the first time and not a buzzard; the kite's forked tail is an identifying feature. Now they seem more numerous here than buzzards. It was good to see and hear more swifts in town yesterday; driving up to the traffic lights in the High Street, I could hear them screaming down the road and briefly caught sight of them. It would have been great to be held up in traffic so I could have had a better look at them but it was flowing freely for once. I wonder how many other people in the High Street noticed them; their screams are such a summer sound. In years gone by I wouldn't have known swifts existed or they live their entire life on the wing, they have the ability to shut down one half of the brain enabling them to do so. I have seen a few swifts in the village; one evening I heard their screams above me and spotted them very high up probably feeding on clouds of insects.



The most important thing we can provide at the moment for the wildlife is a bowl or two of water, regularly topped up and changed. It's not just the birds or hedgehogs that come to drink, I have often found insects, slugs and snails. Recently I have put out a large flower pot tray filled with water as deer have been coming into the garden in the evening at dusk. They come primarily to feast on the small fallen apples which will contain some moisture but the bowl is there if they should need more. The lawn is rather crisp though there are a few areas, like under the hedge, which are still green. I find it amazing the weeds still manage to grow; I can see lots of plantain, yarrow and some ragwort which I must remove! Plants that have grey foliage or small leaves or are hairy will survive better in drought conditions, as transpiration is reduced; lavender with small grey leaves covered in fine hairs can withstand these conditions better than most, and is a magnet for bees.

With the sun out well most days so far this summer, it could be a bumper year for butterflies. The Butterfly Count started 17th July and continues until the 9th August. There have been lots of butterflies in the garden and with several buddleia bushes just outside the house there is no need to step outside to see them.

The house martins have produced a brood from each nest and one is now on its second. However, I think the swallows may be waiting for it to cool down.
