Letter from Archdeacon Louise of Salisbury

A Time of Turning



September always brings a change of rhythm. Children and young people head back to school or off to college for the first time. Holidays end, routines return, and the light begins, almost imperceptibly, to soften and shorten. It can be a season of mixed feelings. For some, there is real hope: new classrooms, new opportunities, new beginnings. For others, there is nervousness — a new school, a new job, a step into the unknown. Some of us mourn the passing of long summer evenings and find the turning of the year quietly sorrowful. Others long for the crispness of autumn, the cooler days and fresher nights.

Both responses are honest, and both are welcome. Change can be exciting, full of promise. It can also be disorientating, even painful, carrying its own small grief.

The sixteenth-century saint Ignatius of Loyola encouraged Christians to seek "God in all things" — not just in church or in prayer, but in the ordinary texture of daily life. Noticing God, for Ignatius, was less about looking for the extraordinary and more about paying attention: to what stirs us, what unsettles us, what draws us closer to life and love.

That practice of attention feels well suited to September. The changing of the seasons, in nature and in our lives, can be a place to notice God. In the dimming evening light and the turning leaves, in anticipation and hope, and equally in anxiety and loss, God is present. The Psalms are full of this same honesty — praise and lament sitting side by side, often in the very same breath.

So perhaps this September, whatever this new season holds for you, it's worth pausing each day to ask, as Ignatius might: where do I see God breaking through today? Whatever changes around us, we hold to this promise: seasons turn, circumstances shift, but God does not change — and God does not leave us to face the turning alone. This is the heart of the ancient Celtic tradition of prayer, echoed in the ancient breastplate prayer attributed to St Patrick, which speaks of Christ beside us, before us, behind us, beneath us and above us, in every direction and in every moment. Whatever this September holds for you — hope or hesitation, excitement or grief — may you know that same presence: God with you, in all things, every step of the way.

Defibrillator Awareness Training



With around 30,000 people each year suffering a sudden cardiac arrest, it is imperative that bystanders know how to respond. A cardiac arrest can affect anyone at any time – from young children at school, to adults when they're at home, work or out in public places. Cardiac arrests are often fatal with The British Heart Foundation's figures revealing that only one in ten victims survive. However, the chance of surviving a cardiac arrest jumps from 6% to 74% if the casualty is in a shockable rhythm and a defibrillator is deployed within 3 minutes.

Although anyone can use a Defibrillator without training, as the instructions are verbally given when the box is opened, it can be a pretty scary experience, and receiving some basic training can give one confidence to go ahead.

Mere and District Link Scheme



We are a local charity taking clients to medical appointments and even shopping when resources are available. We did 163 trips and 6,511 miles in July making it the busiest month I can remember. This included 59 trips to Salisbury Hospital and 42 to RUH Bath. A phenomenal effort by all involved especially as some drivers were unavailable on holiday or with family duties. Our incredible co-ordinators also arranged five trips that were cancelled and for seven trips to be shared by two people. We were unable to find a driver for just three trips. Barbara Thomas BEM, our lead co-ordinator, sent a personal thank you to all drivers, partners and our co-ordinators who have dealt with a particularly difficult time. She said the very heavy workload has been dealt with good grace, humour, hard work and cooperation.

If you want to use the Link, once you have an appointment, please call 01747 860096 to book a driver. We need 48 hours' notice (not including weekends) but will always try to find a driver if given less time, to ring round to find an available driver to take you to your appointment, we cannot guarantee our co-ordinator will be at home to arrange last-minute requests. As a charity we do not charge for trips but ask for a donation. The co-ordinators work in their own homes – we do not have an office - so please keep calls to 9.00 am – 5.00 pm Monday to Friday only using only 01747 860096. **We still need more drivers so if you are interested call the above number**, we pay 55p/mile to cover your expenses.

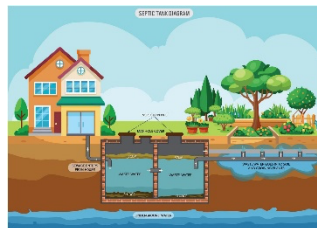

This year it took place on the sunny afternoon of Saturday 1st August. The Show itself attracted a high standard of entries. Swifts do press-ups. Who knew?



For most bird species, wing flapping is the instinctive way chicks build up the muscles needed for flight. Swift chicks, however, do "press-ups". These exercises strengthen their pectoral muscles before they leave the nest for what may be two or three years continuously on the wing. Their first migration, undertaken immediately after fledging, can be between 3,500 and 6,000 miles, depending on where they spend the winter. Swifts are the fastest birds in level flight, reaching speeds of up to 69mph. They eat, sleep and even mate in the air. It is suspected they use unihemispheric sleep, where one half of the brain rests while the other remains alert. They also bathe on the wing, gliding through light drizzle while preening to keep their feathers in perfect condition.

This year we are celebrating the return of breeding swifts to the Upper Deverills after several years without a nesting population. Four years ago, Daniel Kronenberg from Salisbury and Wilton Swifts advised how to encourage them back. Nest boxes were installed and recordings of swift calls played as swifts are colonial nesters attracted by the sound of their own species. Boxes and callers were fitted to local churches and homes across all three villages. In the first year, swifts regularly flew close to my two nest boxes, but it took a long time before one briefly entered, only to leave again. During the second year, on 16th June, I watched one bird and then two entered a box. Eventually a pair occupied each box. One pair stayed for several weeks, the other for a shorter time, but neither bred. This year, everything changed. In April, a swift swept into one of the boxes. My excitement was unbounded! Soon afterwards, both boxes held pairs. The birds came and went regularly, although until July I couldn't be sure they were breeding. Then faecal sacs began appearing beneath one box. Adult droppings or evidence of chicks? I remained hopeful. Before long, a young bird's head appeared at the entrance, showing noticeably more white than an adult. After a few minutes it launched itself into the air. Our first fledged swift? I very much hope so. At about the same time, a broken eggshell appeared beneath the second box. A little yolk remained attached, suggesting an infertile egg, quite normal for first-time breeders.

Swifts arrive in Britain in waves. Those with established nest sites return first, followed by birds seeking to breed the following year, and finally young prospectors searching for suitable colonies with vacant accommodation. Our journey to success followed this pattern. Swift breeding biology is just as remarkable as their aerial lives. Chicks normally fledge between 37 to 56 days. Prolonged wet weather can prevent adults from catching insects. They may travel hundreds of miles in search of food, leaving the chicks alone for extended periods. During these absences the young enter torpor, lowering their body temperature and slowing their metabolism until their parents return with a bolus, a compact ball of insects bound together with saliva and carried in a special throat pouch. Although adult periods away from the nest delays fledging, it greatly improves the chicks' chance of survival. If swifts have visited your box this year, you may be lucky next year.

Nature Notes

When I last wrote I was hoping we would have had some decent rain by now but still the drought goes on. We did actually have a little bit yesterday evening, but I mean a little bit; big drops but not enough of them! I heard the drops falling on the ground and foliage first and to be honest I didn't realise that it was raining, not having or felt any for such a long time. With the ground being so hard we really need days of gentle rain to soak in; if it rains heavily, it will certainly just run off and possibly cause flash flooding. I am still amazed how the weeds keep growing even in these conditions. Any touch of green in our lawn is due to either yarrow or thistle or dandelion (though they are struggling now) or ragwort. I've dug out the flowering ragwort, but I have since noticed a few more plants that are managing to exist.

I've been watering the plants in pots each evening and nearly every evening there has been a roe buck up under the apple trees feeding, sometimes two bucks and yesterday evening there was a muntjac and a roe buck. They don't seem to be worried about me being there; I suppose there is a good distance between me and them, and I think they realise I am no threat to them. They stay for about ten minutes or so and then they are gone, quite often I don't see them as the light can be poor and it is difficult to be sure they have left. On a couple of evenings, I heard some heavy rustling seeming to come from the hedge, too loud to be a hedgehog. Last night I shone the torch up the garden briefly and spotted a deer which I think has been the hedge rustler. We saw a deer in the garden early in the morning lying down and then getting up for breakfast on the fallen apples, I wonder if it comes to stay the night; B & B.



I can't remember seeing any more swifts since that last time in town a month ago with them screaming down the High Street. The swallows haven't done anything in the stables. Normally after their first brood they build the nest up ready for the next, but there's not been much mud available, and I am sure they realise the heat would have been too much for chicks in the nest near the roof. The house martins have been busy, and I think both nests have had two broods. With the nests being artificial they didn't have to rely on mud availability or worry about the nest breaking up in the heat. I am always concerned the chicks could overheat up under the eaves south-facing, but they seem to do OK. Yesterday I noticed lots of house martins and some swallows swooping down to our pond to drink and house martins lining up on the wires nearby. I associate this activity with them getting ready to leave, which is a bit early.



I was a bit disappointed by the number of butterflies this year for the Big Butterfly Count, I wondered if the weather was too hot for them. I saw more hummingbird hawkmoths than any butterfly species, on one day four together. It's certainly been the best year for them that I can remember. They really are just like little hummingbirds feeding on the nectar of tube-shaped flowers, like our buddleia, using their long proboscis while hovering in the air.
